Description:

280 Table Bluff Road consists of three structures to be evaluated for the impact of demolition; a home, a garage, and a barn. According to county records to home was built in 1914. It is a shingle-style home with a gable roof, and simple trim. Currently the home is in a state of demolition, with significant structural deficiencies. The environment has overtaken the home with foliage growing in and around the entire structure. The barn and garage are also early 20th century structures in the shingle-style, with gable roofs and non-descript features.

Historic Significance:

The home, garage, and barn located at 280 Table Bluff Road, Loleta have no historical significance.

Impact of Proposed changes:

These structures do not qualify for the National Register of Historic Places. The demolition of these structures will have no effect on any historical resource: To be eligible for listing in the National Register, a resource must meet at least one of the following criteria:

Is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history (Criterion A).

Is associated with the lives of persons significant in our past (Criterion B).

Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period or method of construction, or represents the work of a master, or possesses high artistic values, or represents a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction (Criterion C).

Has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in history or prehistory (Criterion D).

The property still looks much the way it did in the past, and maintains its characteristics in location, design, materials, workmanship, setting, feeling, and historical association.

Conclusion:

280 Table Bluff is a group of undistinguished single level structures with little historical character in deteriorated condition. These structures do not meet any of the criteria that would make them eligible to be in the National Register of Historic Places. Demolition will have no adverse effect on any historic resource.
