With authorization from the Humboldt County Board of Supervisors and guidance from the Humboldt County Fire Safe Council (HCFSC), County Natural Resources Planning staff, working as part of a joint County–RCD Coordination Team (CCT), will lead implementation of this project. The CCT, with consultant support, will develop the CWPP Implementation Toolkit, produce guides and tutorials, host Implementer Exchange Sessions and GIS office hours, coordinate additional workshops, and oversee production of the Living with Wildfire magazine. Natural Resources Planning Manager, Cybelle Immitt, designated by the Director of Public Works, will provide project leadership and oversee funding administration in coordination with the HCFSC. Senior Environmental Analyst, Julia Cavalli, will serve as Project Manager, handling contracts, contractor oversight, match and expense tracking, reporting, QA/QC, and maintaining auditable records. These paid County staff roles, combined with the RCD's contributions to the CCT, provide the oversight, expertise, and continuity needed to ensure success.

The HCFSC will support implementation by offering guidance based on their expertise and knowledge of the Humboldt County CWPP and may be consulted on various project components. The HCFSC includes Tribal, federal, state, and local partners engaged in wildfire preparedness and management. The roster of current HCFSC members has been uploaded with this application.

The Humboldt County Board of Supervisors will approve the grant agreement if this proposal is funded and will not be paid out of the grant. The Board, comprised of five full-time members: Rex Bohn, Michelle Bushnell, Mike Wilson, Virginia Bass, and Steve Madrone, and enacts legislation governing Humboldt County and sets policy for County departments. The Board created the HCFSC in 2002 and appoints its members to oversee maintenance and implementation of the Humboldt County CWPP.

The Natural Resources Planning Division is currently managing over \$55 million in grant funding, primarily from state funders including CAL FIRE, State Coastal Conservancy, Governor's Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation, among others. Federal funding agreements closed out in the last 5 years, include a Good Neighbor agreement with the USFS for road maintenance for fire safety and evacuation ingress/egress. The County also recently and successfully achieved the deliverables of several state-funded awards including seven CAL FIRE Wildfire Prevention grants, a CA FSC-funded defensible space project, and two rounds of County Coordinator funding.

This project, "CWPP Connect: Tools for Turning Plans into Action," builds on the momentum of the Humboldt County CWPP update and aims to empower partners across Humboldt County to implement priority actions identified in the Plan. The project will create user-friendly tools, enhance partner capacity, and expand community engagement to accelerate wildfire resilience efforts.

CWPP Connect will generate tools and resources to support implementation of the CWPP's ambitious 5-year action plan, with a focus on enabling local partners—including Fire Safe Councils, community groups, fire departments, and others—to take ownership of plan implementation and pursue funding for projects aligned with the countywide strategy. This project is designed to complement existing statewide resources by adapting best practices to our local context and producing hyperlocal tools and examples that are immediately relevant to Humboldt County partners.

The project leverages ongoing work supported by the County's CAL FIRE-funded CWPP Update and the California Fire Safe Council County Coordinator program. These companion efforts provide the technical and organizational foundation on which CWPP Connect will build. The CWPP Update includes a Quantitative Wildfire Risk Assessment (QWRA) and complementary fire behavior modeling, which will generate highly detailed spatial analyses of wildfire exposure and risk. CWPP Connect is designed to translate these technical products into user-friendly tools, guides, and outreach resources that local partners can immediately apply. By aligning new federal funds with these state-supported initiatives, the project ensures efficient use of resources, avoids duplication, and creates a direct pathway for putting CWPP Update outcomes into action.

The project will:

- Develop a Humboldt-focused CWPP Implementation Toolkit hosted on the Humboldt CWPP Hubsite, including guidance documents and sample templates (e.g., Landowner Agreements, defensible space prescriptions, and more).
- Produce educational materials to improve spatial tool literacy and help users access and interpret CWPP WebGIS data. This includes plain-language user guides and video tutorials.
- Host peer learning exchanges (CWPP Implementer Sessions) and GIS office hours to share strategies, troubleshoot barriers, and build a mentorship network.
- Enhance community outreach during the CWPP planning process through additional workshops and partner-led engagement, especially in underrepresented regions.
- Publish a new edition of Living with Wildfire in Northwestern California, a widely distributed regional magazine that communicates wildfire preparedness strategies and connects residents with local programs and resources.

The Humboldt County Fire Safe Council's County Coordination Team (CCT) will lead this project in collaboration with a planning consultant and partners across the county, including four key Implementation Partners already contracted under the County's CAL FIRE-funded CWPP Update grant. The CCT will oversee project implementation, facilitate

stakeholder coordination, and ensure that project deliverables align with the CWPP, CAL FIRE's CWPP Toolkit best practices, and federal grant objectives. Consultants will be contracted for GIS and design work, toolkit development, and support for video and magazine production.

Project outcomes will benefit all of Humboldt County (over 136,000 residents) and neighboring counties where implementation partners are active (e.g., Trinity, Siskiyou, and Mendocino). By developing hyperlocal resources, expanding outreach, and strategically integrating CAL FIRE and County Coordinator investment, CWPP Connect will accelerate implementation of the CWPP action plan and help sustain wildfire resilience work beyond the life of this grant.

This project is focused on planning and education. No vegetation treatments will be developed or implemented. However, planning tools created through this grant will support the design, permitting, and implementation of future vegetation treatment and community resilience projects identified in the Humboldt County CWPP. The Implementation Toolkit and spatial tools will include links to best-available research and permitting guidance to inform sound project planning on non-federal lands.

Educational resources will be developed by the Humboldt County Fire Safe Council's County Coordination Team in consultation with subject-matter experts and regional partners. The CCT includes representatives with experience in wildfire planning, GIS, community outreach, and local project implementation. Research briefs incorporated into project materials will be synthesized by a planning consultant familiar with wildfire resilience science and implementation frameworks.

5. How will the project reduce wildfire hazards in the project area?

CWPP Connect will reduce wildfire hazards in Humboldt County by accelerating the pace and quality of local wildfire resilience planning and implementation. This project will empower community-based organizations, fire agencies, and local government to take coordinated, strategic action on the priority goals identified in the Humboldt County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP). By developing practical tools and clear guidance, CWPP Connect will help local partners translate countywide planning goals into locally led, shovel-ready projects that reduce hazardous fuels, protect communities, and increase preparedness.

The project will increase the use of spatial decision support tools by creating user-friendly guides and tutorials tailored to a non-technical audience. These tools will help partners identify areas of greatest risk, visualize priority actions, and align their efforts with regional strategies. Through implementation workshops, office hours, and peer exchange sessions, CWPP Connect will also build relationships and trust across sectors and geographies, encouraging collaborative planning and implementation of risk reduction efforts.

In addition, the project will expand public education by updating and distributing the regional magazine Living with Wildfire in Northwestern California. This publication will help residents understand their local wildfire risk, learn how to harden homes and maintain defensible space, and connect with programs and resources available through local Fire Safe Councils and fire departments.

The project's success will be measured by the number and quality of tools developed, the engagement of implementation partners, the reach of educational materials, and evidence of follow-up action—such as funding proposals, mitigation projects, and new collaborations—enabled by the project's outputs. By investing in capacity building, strategic planning support, and community engagement, CWPP Connect will lay the groundwork for measurable, sustained wildfire hazard reduction across Humboldt County.

public resources. The CCT and Humboldt County Fire Safe Council collaborators will continue to share and leverage these tools in future outreach, planning, and implementation efforts, extending the impact of this project well beyond the grant term.

The project will engage the broader public through a combination of direct outreach, public education, and collaborative events. A central component will be the development and distribution of a new edition of Living with Wildfire in Northwestern California, a trusted regional publication that offers practical guidance for wildfire preparedness and connects residents to local programs and resources. This magazine will be widely distributed to households, community centers, and libraries across Humboldt County.

To support engagement during the CWPP update process, the project will provide additional staffing for community workshops and small group sessions within priority CWPP Planning Units. These meetings will create opportunities for residents and local stakeholders to share concerns, learn about wildfire risk, and help shape local strategies.

Educational content developed through this project, including spatial tool guides and video tutorials, will be publicly available on the Humboldt County CWPP Hubsite. Project updates and resources will also be disseminated via the Humboldt County Fire Safe Council's newsletter and social media channels, helping to reach a broad audien

CWPP Connect will help catalyze local action by simplifying the steps needed to plan and fund community wildfire resilience projects. By providing user-friendly guidance, funding pathways, and real-world examples, the project will empower partners to initiate and lead implementation efforts.

Peer learning sessions will deepen relationships between practitioners, build shared problem-solving capacity, and highlight replicable models. Expanded outreach will foster a sense of shared responsibility and urgency among residents and landowners.

The project will also reduce barriers to entry for new or under-resourced communities, especially in rural areas without professional grant writers or planning staff. Ultimately, CWPP Connect will support the creation of a self-sustaining, countywide culture of action rooted in local capacity and collaboration.

This project advances all three goals of the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy by strengthening the local infrastructure needed to plan and implement wildfire resilience actions. First, it contributes to Resilient Landscapes by equipping local partners with the tools and knowledge to design effective, locally appropriate mitigation projects that reduce hazardous fuels and improve ecosystem function. The CWPP Implementation Toolkit will include planning templates, permitting guidance, and best practices to streamline project development and encourage landscape-level coordination.

Second, CWPP Connect directly supports the goal of Fire Adapted Communities by expanding community outreach, increasing access to spatial planning tools, and enhancing public awareness. Educational materials, including a widely distributed preparedness magazine and online guides, will help residents understand local wildfire risk and take action to prepare homes, neighborhoods, and evacuation routes. In addition, the project will foster peer learning among implementers and build capacity among Fire Safe Councils and community leaders to lead local planning and outreach efforts.

Finally, the project aligns with the goal of Safe, Effective, Risk-Based Wildfire Response by promoting shared situational awareness and strategic coordination. Spatial tools and guidance developed through the project will help identify priority treatment areas and inform collaborative decision-making among local, state, and federal partners. In doing so, CWPP Connect helps create the conditions for faster, safer, and more effective wildfire response in Humboldt County and neighboring counties.

The most recent update to the Humboldt County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) was certified in January 2019 by the Humboldt County Board of Supervisors as meeting the criteria established under the Healthy Forests Restoration Act. The Humboldt County Fire Chiefs' Association and CAL FIRE Humboldt—Del Norte Unit are also signatories of the Plan.

The 2019 CWPP includes a comprehensive wildfire risk assessment and a five-year action plan designed to guide the efforts of the Humboldt County Fire Safe Council (HCFSC) and its partners. The capacity of the HCFSC and support from grant funds has allowed for the CWPP to be updated every five years. The current update process began in summer 2025 and is scheduled for completion in 2027. It builds on the 2019 framework while incorporating new data, planning tools, and community input to reflect current conditions and advance shared wildfire resilience goals.

This project aligns with the Humboldt County CWPP, particularly priority actions in Part 3 of the 2019 Plan. The update and distribution of Living with Wildfire in Northwestern California directly supports Priority Action 3.2.2-1, "Update Living with Wildfire in Northwestern California and distribute it," under Goal 3.2: Wildfire Preparedness (pg 3.2-3). The CWPP Implementation Toolkit and spatial literacy components advance multiple education and outreach priorities, including Priority Action 3.6.4-2, "Ensure the existence of the Humboldt County Web GIS Portal is well known, and that residents and fire departments understand the benefits of the Community Fire Mapping Project layers" (pg 3.6-4).

At the same time, CWPP Connect goes beyond the scope envisioned in 2019. It has been designed to integrate with and complement the ongoing CWPP update, anticipating emerging needs and creating tools and resources that will support implementation of the new plan as soon as it is completed. The project both fulfills specific priorities of the existing CWPP and establishes forward-looking capacity to accelerate the outcomes of the next plan.

The Humboldt County CWPP does not include a spatially defined boundary for the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI). Instead, the Plan takes a countywide approach to wildfire preparedness and recognizes that most populated areas of Humboldt County are located within or adjacent to wildland fuels and therefore face WUI-related risk. The CWPP includes WUI considerations throughout its risk assessment and action plan, but it does not delineate formal WUI boundaries on a map.

Although the WUI is not explicitly mapped in the CWPP, the project area includes many communities that meet the federal and state definitions of WUI and are functionally located within it. The tools, trainings, and outreach materials developed through this project are intended to benefit all Humboldt County communities, including those in areas of highest wildfire risk where wildlands and development intersect.
