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1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

The City of Eureka is the largest city in Humboldt County with approximately 27,000 people (19% of county population). Eureka serves as the county seat and acts as the center for most government, health care, trade, and arts making it highly transited by visitors and population from all around the county.

According to the California Office of Traffic Safety, in 2017, when compared to 94 cities of similar size, the City of Eureka ranked 2nd for pedestrian involved collisions, 3rd for collisions involving pedestrians under age 15, and 1st for collisions involving pedestrians over the age of 65. In this same year, the City of Eureka ranked 3rd for collisions involving bicyclists and 4th for collisions involving bicyclists under the age of 15.

In the previous year, 2016, when compared to 94 cities of similar size, the City of Eureka ranked 2nd for pedestrian involved collisions, 6th for collisions involving pedestrians under age 15, and 11th for collisions involving bicyclists.

According to SWITRS, between 1/1/2015 and 12/31/2017 there were 82 collisions involving pedestrians and 56 collisions involving bicyclists, 138 total collisions. Eight of the 82 pedestrian collisions resulted in pedestrian fatalities.

Of the 138 total collisions noted above, 54 of these collisions or 40% occurred along Highway 101. Highway 101 is Eureka city main thoroughfare in where many retail, professional businesses, and government facilities are located.

According to TIMS/SWITRS, behaviors that led to collisions include:

- -Motorist failing to yield the right of way to pedestrians
- -Bicyclists riding in the wrong side of the road and failing to yield right of way
- -Drivers not adhering to traffic signs and signals.
- Unsafe behaviors observed by Eureka City School's parents include:
- -Drivers not yielding to pedestrians, not adhering to traffic signs and signals, and additional bad driving habits.

The issues mentioned above are affecting City of Eureka residents. According the U.S. Census Bureau in the year of 2017, nearly 13 % of the population in the City of Eureka walked, biked, or used public transit as their main means of transportation. Moreover, according to the 2018 Humboldt County Community Health Assessment, unintentional injuries are the leading cause of preventable and premature death in the county. Nearly 1/3 of these unintentional injuries are from motor vehicle collisions.

Recent efforts to increase safety in Eureka include the development of a localized Pedestrian and Bicycle Friendly Driver program delivered to community based organizations, the passage of AB321, reducing the speed limit in school zones, as well as a cycle 1 Active Transportation Program non-infrastructure grant which concluded in April 2018. The proposed project would build upon and complement these efforts with outreach and education to motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians.

The target population served by this grant proposal are residents of the north and west sections of Eureka. North and West Eureka is home to both Alice Birney and Lafayette Elementary School districts, along with over 400 low-income and public housing units for low-income families. According to California Department of Education, 92% of Alice Birney students and 87% of Lafayette students are eligible for free and reduced price meals (FRPM). Eureka's north and west sections are also home to the majority of government facilities and community based organizations that provide low-income residents, youth and families assistance with housing, family services, food security, health services and more. Additionally, many of the retail and professional businesses in Eureka are situated in the north and west sections of the city. The locations previously mentioned are higher traffic areas that have Highway 101 running through it. Program activities will occur in multiple settings that, depending on the event, will target youth, families and/or adult individuals that walk, bike or drive in the community.

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Program activities will include educating bicyclists and pedestrians on how to be safe on the road which could decrease the number of collisions as well as increase confidence among community members to feel comfortable walking and biking to local destinations.
