

# SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT PLAN - REVISED

October 30, 2025



## **Purpose of the System Improvement Plan in Child Welfare Services:**

As part of a nationwide Children and Family Services Review (CFSR) process, the federal Department of Health and Human Services Children’s Bureau oversees a quality assurance system to review states’ and counties’ accountability to established outcome measures and standards for access to and quality of services for at-risk children and families, in accordance with Titles IV-B and IV-E of the Social Security Act.

California counties submit their System Improvement Plan (SIP) to the state and the states submit their Performance Improvement Plan (PIP) to the federal government for review. The intent is to have a coordinated approach among federal, states, and counties’ efforts and activities that are mutually supportive. Meaningful engagement with Tribes in this process is also a critical component and core value for California Department of Social Services (CDSS) and Humboldt County Child Welfare Services (CWS).

California’s quality assurance system, known as the California-Child and Family Services Review (C-CFSR), is patterned after the federal CFSR. The outcomes-based review system is intended to promote the state and counties to improve programs, services, and outcomes in safety, well-being and permanency for at-risk children and families that receive services from the county’s Child Welfare Services (CWS) or Juvenile Probation systems. The C-CFSR is conducted by counties over a five-year cycle, which encompasses the County Self-Assessment (CSA) and Peer Review. Results from the CSA and Peer Review then guide the subsequent five-year System Improvement Plan (SIP) and counties monitor progress to those plans through annual SIP progress reports.

## **Introduction to Humboldt County Child Welfare Services’ System Improvement Plan (SIP):**

In 2021 and 2022, Humboldt County Child Welfare Services (HC-CWS) worked to develop their System Improvement Plan (SIP) for 2023-2027 through a culmination of numerous feedback sources. A SIP Core planning team was created to ensure robust participation in the development of the SIP. CSA report findings and recommendations, feedback from Tribes, community stakeholders and peer reviewers, and qualitative and quantitative data from multiple sources were used to inform, prioritize and guide the five-year strategic SIP. County information and data measures were analyzed, outcome comparisons to state and national standards were reviewed, and county performance trends were assessed for areas to improve for positive impacts on children/family outcomes. A full draft SIP for Humboldt County was originally submitted to CDSS on March 15, 2024 that included specific goals, strategies and action steps that had been prioritized through the CFSR process.

During the SIP development period, Humboldt County Child Welfare Services (HC-CWS), along with other child protection agencies across the state and nation, was experiencing increased staffing shortages. These staffing shortages were a driving factor behind some compliance issues that were

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identified in 2022, specifically HC-CWS's compliance with conducting child maltreatment investigations within the statutory timeframes.

In the Spring of 2023, HC-CWS took decisive action to prioritize and address investigation timeliness and close a backlog of investigations. However, remedying the situation was not a simple or quick fix. Around this same time, local Humboldt County Tribes lifted concerns to the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) regarding HC-CWS's investigation timeliness, Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) compliance and delays in HC-CWS's documentation. This resulted in CDSS conducting an on-site review of HC-CWS in June of 2023.

Prior to the on-site review by CDSS, HC-CWS had initiated several strategies and action steps to correct the shared concerns that were lifted to CDSS by local Tribes. When Humboldt County CWS received CDSS's Onsite Review and Findings report in January 2024 that summarized CDSS's findings and recommendations, many of the compliance areas of concern were being addressed. In response to the CDSS Onsite Review and Findings report, HC-CWS developed an implementation plan to address all areas covered.

Following the CDSS audit and report, there were also several meetings and discussions with CDSS and local Tribes regarding the work needed to address the acknowledged concerns. Simultaneously, Humboldt County had just completed their CFSR process, as described above. As the SIP process is intended to address identified needs within the CWS system, there were many meetings and discussions with HC-CWS leadership, CDSS and local Tribes regarding how to address the acknowledged and shared concerns and whether a revised SIP was the correct process to cement the systemic changes that HC-CWS, local Tribes and CDSS deemed necessary.

HC-CWS had submitted a draft of the SIP in March 2024, but due to the discussions underway about the whether the SIP should be updated to focus on the areas of practice that were the focus of the audit and the Tribal concerns, CDSS delayed approval of the submitted SIP. Revising the SIP to focus on priorities identified by Tribal partners also aligned with the commitment made by the CWS Director that all future Humboldt County SIPs would always include an ICWA specific goal. In 2025, CDSS indicated that a *revised* SIP could be developed in partnership with local Tribes and CDSS. Humboldt County CWS worked closely with local Tribal partners to develop a new set of strategies and actions steps to be included in the county's 2023-2027 SIP.

## Summary of Action Taken:

Humboldt County made several systematic changes in response to the concerns that were brought to light in the CDSS Onsite Review and Findings report, as well as other listening sessions that were held with local Tribal partners since the initial concerns were lifted to CDSS. It should be noted that Humboldt County Tribes always have, and continue to advocate ardently for system improvements in the interest of their Tribal communities. This is a gift to Humboldt County CWS and all tribal

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children in Humboldt County, and has resulted in many important changes. Humboldt County CWS is grateful for their expertise and partnership.

Below is a summary of HC-CWS's innovative actions taken to address findings and recommendations that took place during the 2023-2027 SIP period.

- **Maintaining and Documenting Investigation Timeliness**

- HC-CWS increased investigator staffing levels in May of 2023 by reassigning seven Social Workers from other programs to Emergency Response (ER) Investigations.
- HC-CWS maintained, and continues to maintain, all Investigation units at full staffing levels. If/when staff assigned to Investigations separate, HC-CWS prioritizes assigning new hires to Investigations or reassigns staff from other programs.
- HC-CWS created a temporary Backlog Unit in May of 2023 and transferred all backlogged investigations to the Backlog Unit. All investigations that were open beyond 40 days at that time were transferred to the backlog unit. All backlogged investigations were closed by September 18, 2023.
- HC-CWS implemented robust and frequent investigation status reporting and monitoring in July of 2023, which included but was not limited to: two weekly reports, and one monthly report that is disseminated to ER and ICWA ER Social Worker Supervisors, Programs Managers, Deputy Directors, Director, and Analysts.
- HC-CWS initiated a formal Quality Improvement Project (QIP) to improve and sustain the percentage of investigations closed timely. The QIP included a formal set of timebound goals with specific strategies and action steps to support timely investigations. The two goals established for the QIP were met by December 31, 2023.
- HC-CWS held working sessions with ER and ICWA-ER staff in July and August 2023 to develop an ER Process Map detailing all the activities that may be required during the course of an investigation. Analysts documented the information in an easy to follow informational workflow tool. This Process Map allowed for identifying areas to improve processes and efficiency, as well as assist new and existing staff in expectation and process.
- In August of 2023, Investigating Social Workers were issued 2-in-1 tablet style laptops, with built-in Wifi to support documentation in the field as well as other field activities.
- In August of 2023, targets were established for the number of new investigations that would be assigned to a social worker in a month and this is monitored monthly.
- In July 2023, CWS Administration began meeting weekly with ER and ICWA ER Supervisor, Program Managers and Analysts to monitor investigation compliance data and activities. During these meetings, staff discuss current performance, strategies for improvement, and data trends. In December 2023, the meeting recurrence was changed to bi-weekly to due significant improvements in compliance.

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- **Improving Indian Child Welfare Act Active Efforts and Inquiry/Notice and Improved Safety Planning**
  - HC-CWS designed and implemented a custom-built electronic web-based application that uploads and securely sends referral intake documents and several other CWS referral and case documentation to Tribal Social Services staff. The application is web-based and accessible to CWS staff working either on-site or remote. The application has each Tribe's specific contact information built into the application. The CWS Tribal Cross Report application creates a centralized location for CWS staff to send critical documents to Tribes, allowing for a single database for tracking and monitoring that the documents were sent and when they were sent.
  - HC-CWS initiated the routine distribution of a Weekly Tribal Cross Report Dashboard providing performance data and information on any referrals requiring follow-up. This dashboard is disseminated to supervisors, management leadership and staff. This dashboard meshes data from the ICWA tab in CWS/CMS against transactions sent through the external Tribal Cross Reporting application and calculates the percentage of reports requiring a cross report (per CWS/CMS) that have been sent through the application. The dashboard presents the percentage successfully sent, and also provides a list of any outstanding referrals that still need the documentation sent.
  - HC-CWS implemented a process for Screeners to enter all collateral contacts, including Tribal Inquiry and Notice, that are conducted during the screening process as collateral contacts in CWS/CMS. All Tribal contacts completed during the hotline/screening process were previously documented in the body of the Screener narrative. This new process, and where Tribal contacts will now appear in ER Referral documentation, was presented and reviewed with Tribes. HC-CWS implemented a monthly report to calculate the percentage of reports received at the hotline that had a contact with a Tribal representative within 1 day.
  - The FM/FR program implemented a process that investigating Social Workers must obtain a completed ICWA-020 from each parent before a case can transfer from the ER program to the FM/FR program, ensuring that ICWA-020s are obtained near case opening.
  - HC-CWS staff and Tribes came together across multiple meetings to jointly develop a Decision Making Vision statement pertaining to Tribal/ICWA casework. Multiple levels of CWS staff & Tribal staff, who will be expected to carry out the Decision Making vision, were included in the creation of this vision, including Social Worker Supervisors & Social Workers.
  - HC-CWS contracted with California Tribal Families Coalition (CTFC) to hold an all-day Active Efforts Joint Training that was mandatory for ICWA program staff. This training was held on June 6, 2024 and was attended by 42 staff from CWS as well as several Tribal representatives.

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- HC-CWS contracted with Evident Change, as well as CTFC, to provide CWS's 2nd "Joint Day of Training", which took place on October 23-24, 2023. This training was focused on Safety Assessments. The training was attended by 36 CWS staff as well as several Tribal Social Services staff and CWS Cultural Coaches.
- HC-CWS contracted with Evident Change, as well as CTFC and Dr. Lara Kishan, to provide CWS's 3rd "Joint Day of Training" which took place on July 16-18, 2024. This training was focused on Safety Assessments and Safety Planning. The training was attended by 45 CWS staff, Tribal Social Services staff and CWS Cultural Coaches.

During this period, HC-CWS and CDSS were in regular communication regarding Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) activities and activities planned and taken to improve practice and the issues raised by Tribes.

### **Ongoing Tribal Engagement:**

In addition to the specific activities above, HC-CWS continued, and continues to host a collaborative meeting with Tribes on Fridays from 9:30-11am. These meetings offer a space for Tribes to elevate concerns and needs, and often include specific agenda items (see above for examples of this work since 2022). The Director and Deputy Directors of HC-CWS regularly attend to give Tribes access to CWS leadership and to ensure that leadership directly hears Tribal priorities and concerns. The HC-CWS ICWA Program Manager facilitates the meetings.

### **Revised System Improvement Plan:**

Based on the CDSS audit and report, and the findings from collaborative meetings with Tribes described above, HC-CWS developed a new draft set of strategies, and action steps for a revised SIP that was focused on the performance areas covered in the audit and report. When this draft was presented to Tribes in March of 2025, there was a stated desire from Tribal partners to create a new SIP together, that was informed by current needs and strengths of HC-CWS, as determined collaboratively with Tribes. Based on this feedback, HC-CWS hosted two in person SIP planning sessions specifically for Tribal partners, with the purpose of fulfilling the Tribes' request to develop the SIP together. The meetings were held on August 15, 2025 and September 5, 2025.

The meeting on August 15, 2025 began with an open-ended prompt to facilitate brainstorming around what HC-CWS could do to improve ICWA compliance and Tribal collaboration. Based on the

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results of the brainstorm, meeting participants created the common themes listed below. After common themes were identified, there was a robust discussion about each of the theme areas.

Following the theming exercise, the group then participated in a prioritization/scoring exercise where the participants ranked their top three strategies. The results of this work are listed below, a higher number indicates a higher priority to meeting participants.

Strategy/Theme	Priority Score
Improve timeliness, relevance and accuracy of communication and documentation	15
Improve and understand active efforts	10
Improve court collaboration and decision-making	9
Respect Tribal sovereignty	6
Improve family engagement	4
Improvement safety planning	0

The second SIP-focused in person meeting was held on September 5, 2025. Rather than just choosing the highest priority score, the group discussed the top three strategies and agreed to prioritize the following two strategies for the new SIP:

- Improve timeliness, relevance, and accuracy of communication and documentation.
- Improve court collaboration and decision-making.

The group supported the assertion that improvements in these two areas would facilitate the strategy that was not chosen- Improve and understand active efforts- and was more specific and measurable, which is important for a successful SIP.

The remainder of the meeting was spent brainstorming and discussing potential action steps for the two selected strategies.

Following the September 5, 2025 meeting, HC-CWS reviewed, combined, and themed the action steps and put together a new iteration of the SIP chart focused on ICWA compliance and Tribal collaboration. The draft chart was sent to Tribes for a final review. No additional feedback was received from Tribes and the chart was finalized in mid-October.

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## SERVICE PROVISION FOR CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF PROGRAMS

CSA findings were used in the county's needs assessment process to plan and coordinate integrated Child Abuse Prevention, Intervention and Treatment (CAPIT), Community Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP), and Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF) programs within the county. Humboldt County DHHS, Social Services Branch is the designated administrator for the CAPIT, CBCAP, PSSF, and Children's Trust Fund programs. The planning team composition for the CSA and SIP was essentially the same as for the CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF plan, since CSA recommendations and SIP goals, strategies and action steps directly impact how services and funds will be prioritized for the CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF programs.

### Designated Public Agency

Administrative oversight of CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF program, including distribution and receipt of program funds, will remain the responsibility of the Humboldt County DHHS. This Department has been designated as the local liaison for these programs. Responsibility for oversight/monitoring of local services, program compliance, data collection, five-year plan amendments, annual reporting and annual program evaluation will also be the responsibility of the Humboldt County DHHS. This includes ensuring that programs funded by CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF will track client participation and satisfaction and also measure program and service delivery effectiveness.

The Department Liaison for CAPIT will maintain regular communication with the contractor(s) for the CAPIT program and will have face-to-face contact at least semi-annually to review goals and monitor progress. The CAPIT contractor (McKinleyville Family Resource Center) will be required to submit quarterly narrative and statistical reports in addition to invoicing for services. The contractor for CAPIT is required to capture data needed for the OCAP annual report.

The Department Liaison for CBCAP maintains at least monthly contact with the programs funded by CBCAP to monitor expenditures and compliance with the stated goals of each program, as does the Fiscal Services Unit. Data required for the OCAP annual report will be gathered by DHHS and the Fiscal Service Unit.

### The Role of the CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF Liaisons

The role of the Humboldt County DHHS CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF Liaisons are to meet regularly (at least annually) with DHHS Fiscal Services, DHHS Quality Management Services/R&E and CAPCC representatives to discuss administrative oversight of the CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF Program funds, compliance with the state guidelines of CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF, and quality assurance of progress toward achieving planned outcomes. A DHHS CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF Liaison and Probation representative also serves on the CAPCC Board to assist with county coordination efforts.

### Fiscal Oversight

The Humboldt County DHHS is the designated fiscal administrator for the CAPIT, CBCAP PSSF, and Children's Trust Fund (CTF) programs. Each program is tracked separately through the Department's

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Fiscal Services Unit and each has a separate budget and accounting system. Each request for funding to provide services or resources is submitted by the social worker for approval by the worker's supervisor and program manager, and if over \$250 is also approved by the CWS deputy director or CWS director. Any contracted services are invoiced to the county on a quarterly basis for services rendered. To facilitate fund/data tracking, service providers are requested to submit information electronically (e.g. RFPs, data and expenditure reports, etc.).

CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF and CTF funds will be maximized by DHHS through leveraging of funds for establishing or expanding community-based and prevention-focused programs and activities. The Department's Administrative Fiscal Unit will ensure that the CAPIT/CBCAP/PSSF and CTF funds received will supplement, not supplant, other state and local public funds and services. The county's funding streams work in tandem with community-based resources to offer comprehensive child maltreatment prevention services to all children and families in the county that need support, not just families involved in the CWS system. For example, funding from the county and local agencies such as First 5 Humboldt may use funds to provide parenting classes, support, child care, and supplies while the Family Resource Centers provide the site and co-facilitation for the program.

Fiscal Services will assist with tracking of PSSF funds to ensure that a minimum of 20% goes to each of the four PSSF service categories (Family Preservation, Family Support, Time-Limited Reunification, and Adoption Promotion & Support). Staff will receive more training in time-studying services to PSSF and PSSF will be discussed between Fiscal and CWS leadership to ensure all PSSF services are being provided and time allocated appropriately.

## 1. Tribal Collaboration Checklist

- a. Humboldt County CWS developed a checklist that is used for all investigations involving Tribal children. Staff complete the checklist throughout the length of an investigation, dating and initialing tribal collaboration at each key decision point listed on the checklist.
- b. A blank template is uploaded into CWS/CMS under our County docs for staff to generate one for every investigation involving a tribal child.
- c. The checklist acts as a reminder and accountability tool for staff to use with each investigation
- d. A completed checklist is saved with the referral.
- e. See Tribal Collaboration Checklist.

## 2. Electronic Tribal Cross Report Application and Weekly Reporting

- a. Humboldt County CWS developed a custom Tribal Cross Reporting Application
  - i. Humboldt County CWS designed an electronic web-based application that uploads and securely sends referral intake documents and several other CWS referral and case documentation to Tribal Social Services staff.
  - ii. The application is web-based and accessible to CWS staff working either on-site or remote, 24/7.
  - iii. The application has each Tribe's specific contact information built into the application. The application sends the documents via each Tribe's preferred method: this may be a single email, a list of emails or a fax number, depending on the Tribe's specific instructions for sending documents.
  - iv. The CWS Tribal Cross Report application creates a centralized location for CWS staff to send critical documents to Tribes. The centralized application allows for a single database for tracking and monitoring that the documents were sent and when they were sent.
  - v. Utilizes Concord e-fax
- b. Humboldt CWS generates a Weekly Tribal Cross Report Dashboard providing performance data and information on any referrals requiring follow-up
  - i. CWS generates a weekly dashboard that is disseminated to supervisors, management leadership and staff. This dashboard meshes data from the ICWA tab in CWS/CMS against transactions sent through the external application and calculates the percentage of reports requiring a cross report (per CWS/CMS) that have been sent through the application. The dashboard presents the percentage successfully sent, a list of any outstanding referrals that still need the documentation sent. The dashboard also presents the percentage of Tribal referrals with the intake documentation sent within 24 hours, the percentage sent within 48 hours and the average days to cross report by month.
  - ii. Utilizes Business Intelligence, Tableau and e-fax

## 3. Tribal Collaboration P&P Fidelity Tools and Periodic Reviews

- a. Humboldt County CWS developed two Tribal Collaboration fidelity tools.

- i. The Tribal Collaboration Supervisor Intake Checklist is used to determine whether each step of the tribal collaboration process occurred at the Screening/Intake level.
- ii. The Tribal Collaboration Tool Investigations – Supervisor Checklist is used to determine whether each step of the tribal collaboration process occurred during an investigation.
- iii. CWS’s CQI program staff conduct periodic reviews, selecting a random sample of reports and investigations.
- iv. Aggregated data from the results of the review are presented in data dashboards and shared with ICWA program manager and CWS administration, as well as Tribes.

## 4. Tribal Collaboration Perceptions Report – A Qualitative Analysis of Child Welfare Staff and Tribal Government Staff Perspectives on the Current Status of Tribal Collaboration

- a. Humboldt County CWS CQI staff conducted a qualitative assessment as part of quality improvement project related to Tribal Collaboration. This project looked at the impact and effectiveness of current Tribal Collaboration efforts, according to CWS staff and members of local Tribal Governments. Several interviews with Tribal social services staff as well as CWS ICWA program staff occurred and the questions were designed to reflect the “Tribal Collaboration Tool – Supervisor Checklist” to parallel the periodic data collected using this checklist. A detailed report summarized the findings was released. The report was shared with Tribes as well.

## 5. ICWA Program Caseload Monitoring

- a. Weekly report with the number of Investigations and Cases open by Tribe is disseminated to supervisors, managers, deputies and director
- b. Target maximum ICWA caseload goal are established and presented on the dashboard, and investigation and caseloads are monitoring against goal weekly. Weekly caseload dashboard provide the caseload average, min and max.
- c. Utilize Business Intelligence and Tableau

## 6. ICWA Joint Investigation Contacts

- a. Humboldt County CWS generates a monthly dashboard that tracks and reports the proportion of contacts with families that included a tribal representative present at the contact. The dashboard also tracks and reports the proportion of investigations that have at least one contact with a tribal representative documented. The purpose is to better understand and measure tribal collaboration activities during investigations.
- b. This report utilizes Business Intelligence.

## 7. Monthly Referral and Case lists sent to all 8 Tribes each month

- a. ICWA Program Analyst runs Tribe specific referral and case reports and sends the lists to the 8 local Tribes.

## 8. Monthly Data Report out to all 8 Tribes each month

- a. Humboldt CWS provides aggregated data dashboards to Tribal Social Services Directors and staff from the 8 local Humboldt County, including but not limited to compliance reports for Tribally involved families on: investigation timeliness, cross reports to Tribes at intake, timely mental health screening and referral, timely child and family team meetings, timely court reports, and timely case plans

## 9. Custom SafeMeasures Features

- a. Requested additional subset and filtering features to isolate data by Humboldt County specific Tribes
- b. Humboldt created CWS/CMS caseload accounts for each Tribe in CWS/CMS and assigns secondary assignment for the Tribe in CWS/CMS when the Tribe has confirmed eligibility or enrollment. This provides for additional reporting and Humboldt County uses this for these new SafeMeasures filters.
- c. Humboldt can now filter several SafeMeasures compliance reports by specific Humboldt County Tribes

## 10. Standing Meetings and Presentations to Tribal Councils

- a. Humboldt County has several standing meetings, and also meets as requested with Tribal Social Services staff and Tribal Councils.
- b. Humboldt County CWS has gone before the Tribal Councils of 6 local Tribes, many on more than one occasion
  - i. These presentations have included compliance and performance data sharing.
- c. Humboldt County has a standing weekly meeting with all 8 Tribes.
  - i. CWS provides compensation to all 8 Tribes for their expert consultation at these meetings.

## CWS TRIBAL CROSS REPORTING APPLICATION INFO SHEET

What is the CWS Tribal Cross Reporting Application?

- The CWS Tribal Cross Report application is a DHHS custom-built application for uploading and sending cross reports and other CWS referral and case documentation to Tribal Social Services staff. The application is only used when sending specific documentation to Tribes.
- The application is web-based and would be accessible to CWS staff working either on-site or remote, 24/7.

How will the recipient know if the communication was sent through the Tribal Cross Reporting Application?

- Email recipients will receive an email from the following email:  
[CWSTribalCollaboration@co.humboldt.ca.us](mailto:CWSTribalCollaboration@co.humboldt.ca.us)
- Fax recipients will receive a fax cover page and the attachments

What will the incoming message look like?

- The subject line for all emails sent through the cross reporting application will include the type of documents being sent (Initial Report, Closing Report, Case Plan, etc.), the Referral/Case ID#, and the name of the Tribe or individual they are being sent to.
- For Tribes who opt to receive messages via fax, a coversheet on DHHS-CWS letterhead will include a Subject line at the top that includes the type of documents being sent (Initial Report, Closing Report, Case Plan, etc.), the Referral/Case ID#, and the name of the Tribe or individual they are being sent to.
- Below is an example of the subject line:

Will the recipient be provided contact information for the assigned Social Worker?

- Yes. Although the email will come from [CWSTribalCollaboration@co.humboldt.ca.us](mailto:CWSTribalCollaboration@co.humboldt.ca.us), the Social Worker name, email and phone number will be included in the body of the email (or on the fax cover sheet for Tribes that have a fax number listed).

What are the benefits of the Tribal Cross Reporting Application?

- The application has each Tribe's specific contact information from the Tribal Contact Information Sheet entered into the application. The application will send the documents via the preferred method: this may be a single email, a list of emails or a fax number, depending on the Tribe's specific instructions for sending documents.
- The CWS Tribal Cross Report application creates a centralized location for CWS to send critical documents to Tribes. The centralized application allows for a single database for tracking and monitoring that the documents were sent and when they were sent.



## CWS TRIBAL CROSS REPORTING APPLICATION INFO SHEET

- The CWS Tribal Cross Report application will be updated with the contact information from the Tribal Contact Information Sheet, so the worker only needs to select the Tribe or Tribes by checking a box and the documents will be sent to Tribe(s).
- The application includes fields naming specific documentation as a reminder for what documents need to be sent to Tribes.
- All communications sent through the application will be sent encrypted.

Does the recipient need to have the Tribal Cross Reporting Application or any special software?

- No. The recipient does not need the application or any special software to receive communications sent through the CWS Tribal Cross Report application.

Will the messages be sent encrypted?

- Yes. The emails and e-faxes will be sent encrypted. Recipients will need to enter a one-time passcode to retrieve each message.

If a Tribe has more than one recipient that needs the documents, can the communications be sent to multiple emails at the same time?

- Yes. If a Tribe has multiple emails listed on the Tribal Contact Information Sheet for sending documents, ALL emails will receive each communication sent to that Tribe when the application is used.

Will all communications from CWS staff come through the Tribal Cross Reporting Application?

- No. The Tribal Cross Reporting Application will be used for sending specific documents, including those listed below. Some communications will still be sent directly from specific staff email.
  - Initial Report to Tribes (referral documents upon receipt of new referral – evaluated out and investigated – Screener Narrative, SDM Hotline Tool, ER Referral Document)
  - Closing Report to Tribes (Investigation Narrative, Safety Assessment, Risk Assessment)
  - Case Plan
  - Discovery (Delivered Service Logs)
  - Court Reports
  - CFT Forms/Summary Reports
- Case coordination correspondence and other communications will continue to be sent from worker emails.

Will the CWS Tribal Cross Reporting Application be used for sending working documents to gather feedback from Tribal staff?

- No. The application will be used to send the final pdf versions of documents, not working versions. Staff will communicate via their work email/phone or in-person when developing documentation.



## CWS TRIBAL CROSS REPORTING APPLICATION INFO SHEET

Will the CWS Tribal Cross Reporting Application be accessible via cell phones?

- No. The application is currently not accessible via cell phone.

Will the CWS Tribal Cross Reporting Application be used when verifying Tribal eligibility or enrollment status?

- No. The application will be used for transmitting attachments only after a Tribe has confirmed eligibility/enrollment status.

Opening Comments:

- Meeting Goal: To begin to flesh out the System Improvement Plan (SIP) goal around responsiveness to community (Tribal community) and ICWA compliance and come out of the meeting with a couple overarching strategies, and to begin fleshing out action steps for those strategies.
- The Tribal representatives at the meeting (Trinidad Rancheria & Yurok Tribe) were asked to reach out to the other representatives not present at the meeting, share the strategies generated during this meeting, and ask for any feedback.
- Reiterated that the goal is to have these SIP Strategies and Action Steps identified and prioritized by the Tribes.

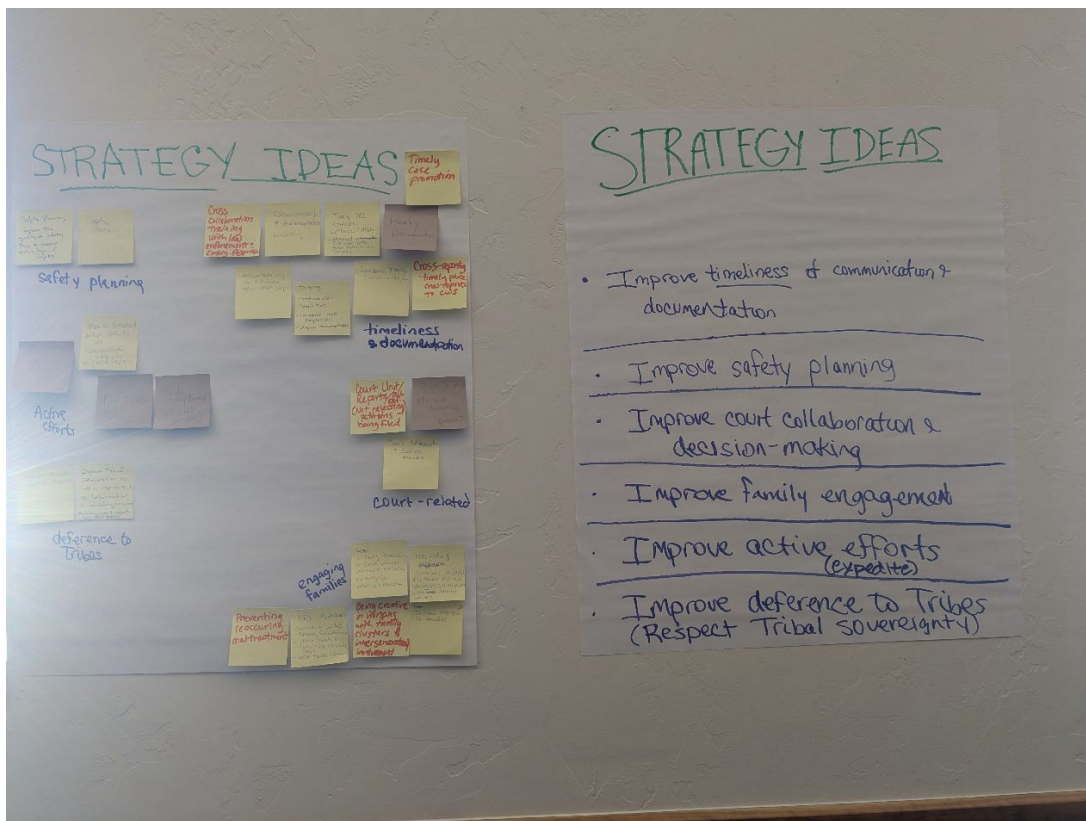
## Notes:

The group was provided post it notes and approximately 15 minutes to write down Tribally important strategies/practice areas and place their post its on the posters on the wall.

Following this exercise, Dawn, Kim and Ivy analyzed the information on the post-its to identify clear groupings and emerging themes from the post-its. The post-its were moved around and organized in order to group the ones together that had overlap/duplication/similarity and the below Strategies/themes were identified from the exercise (no particular order below):

- Improve Timeliness, Relevance, and Accuracy of Communication and Documentation
- Improving and Understanding Active Efforts
- Improve Court Collaboration and Decision Making
- Respecting Tribal Sovereignty
- Improve Family Engagement
- Improve Safety Planning

The group then reviewed and discussed the grouping/theming that was identified to ensure agreement on the groupings. All post-its fell into the groupings listed above.



Following the grouping/theming, the group was then asked to use stickers and a color coding system to place stickers denoting their first, second and third priority from the above themes.

Using a coding system of first priority receiving 3 points, second priority 2 points and third priority 1 point, points for each strategy/theme above were tallied to identify the group's first, second and third priority from the above strategies.

The group then discussed in detail each of the Strategy Themes.



Below is a summary of the Strategy themes and notes from the discussion.

Strategy Themes, Tallied Votes, and Action Steps:

- Improve Timeliness, Relevance, and Accuracy of Communication and Documentation (Score = 15)
  - In terms of accuracy, it is important for SWs to document not just what happened, but go into details on elements like how parents are presenting themselves, or whether they are

under the influence, or are combative. These might be indicators of more serious issues (DV, abuse). SW's don't like having hard conversations and will not call contradictory information out.

- ICWA-020 and 030 forms rarely have family finding or family tree information. The Yurok Tribe will have access to information on Tribal relatives through their enrollment department, but non-Tribal relatives are difficult to find information for.
- A template uniform contact sheet exists, one for Emergency Response (ER) referrals and another for regular cases.
- Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) reports often have incomplete entries.
- Action Steps:
  - Update Action Policies and Procedures and Train Staff on Inquiry Documentation (020/030 forms)
  - Random reviews/audits can be used to ensure continuous quality improvement. Corrective action can be made if progress isn't being met. Supervisors can also work with staff to do weekly checks around timely contact entry.
    - A good KPI are monthly reports on timely and accurate contact form entry.
    - There is no Division 31 or federal mandate for entry of contacts. CWS P&P says within three business days. Another common practice is within three days OR within the month that the case was made.
  - Implement a mandatory structured contact sheet using the existing sheets for ER and Ongoing cases.
  - Cross collaboration training with law enforcement and emergency response teams.
- Improving and Understanding Active Efforts (Score = 10)
  - Active Efforts compliance is defined by a medley of factors, timeliness included.
  - Adding to the court report template a description of what an Active Effort is. Ensure that it includes details on what was specific and active to the particular family involved. This will help SWs understand Active vs Reasonable Efforts.
    - Often SWs push Active Efforts off until closer to the court report date, and have no engagement with Tribes. The efforts, by definition, are not Active Efforts. The purpose is to support the best outcomes for Native families, and if families are waiting months on those Active Efforts, it isn't in their best interest.
- Improve Court Collaboration and Decision Making (Score = 9)
  - How are warrants connected to safety? Should warrant work be embedded?
- Respecting Tribal Sovereignty (Score = 6)
  - It was agreed that Respecting Tribal Sovereignty will be the lens through which each strategy will be conducted. "Intention" needs to be a part of the definition/explanation for this.
- Improve Family Engagement (Score = 4)
  - This strategy is focused on within the other SIP goal areas.
- Improve Safety Planning (Score = 0)

- This was raised due to cross reporting being inconsistent, resulting in Tribal CWS learning about immediate safety concerns for a particular case much later on (days later). Collaborative Training between law enforcement could be an action step.
- CWS has a Quality Improvement Program (QIP) process which includes safety planning. As such, there are elements of safety planning that County CWS is addressing immediately (ex. Not accepting safety plans that allow parents to continue to use substances if that creates an unsafe environment). Does safety planning need to be a part of the SIP if it is already in the QIP, and if so what parts of safety planning will be elevated in each?
  - Practice for SWs needs clear direction. Part of including safety planning in the QIP is due to the confusion from County Staff on what boundaries are acceptable between parental action and substance use (ex. Allowing parents to not use at home, but come back and perform parental duties while high). This compounded with community partners and their focus on harm reduction (not inducing harm by removal from the home).
  - On the other hand, it isn't alright to normalize that these types of environments and situations are safe for children. The act of not taking action on a SW's part communicates the behavior as acceptable, and can have impacts on a child's self esteem and worth. This also has generational impacts. The idea of impact comes up for staff commonly, as removal causes impact. However, there is also an impact of leaving a child in a home where they are not having their needs met and are unsafe. ICWA program has to indicate the level of impact in the court reports, but there are different ways to indicate impact.
- Child welfare = child safety, if parents are in the way of the safety of their child, then removal can be justified. What tools do SW's need to have hard and direct conversations with parents about the impact on their children and why SWs are present?

Below are the raw notes from the first exercise to identify emerging Strategy themes.

- Improve Timeliness, Relevance, and Accuracy of Communication and Documentation
  - Timely case promotion
  - Timely documentation
  - Cross-reporting, timely police cross reports to CWS
  - Timely DSL entries with Tribal collaboration. Need relevant info that relates to worries
  - Consistent and timely communication
  - Follow through on documentation accuracy
  - Inquiry, improve 020 completion, increase 030 completion. Inquiry documentation, family finding
  - Cross collaboration training with law enforcement and emergency response
  - Accountability to following up on next steps
  - Cross reporting not consistent
  - Timely decision making

- Improving and Understanding Active Efforts
  - Active efforts?
  - How to document active efforts vs reasonable efforts in court reports
  - Delineating reasonable from active efforts
  - Bus tickets
  - ICWA compliance (get more specific)
- Improve Court Collaboration and Decision Making
  - Court unit/reports/push off (not rejecting) petitions being filed
  - Warrant decisions and process?
  - Court collaboration and decision making
- Respecting Tribal Sovereignty
  - Change attitudes towards deference
  - Improve Tribal collaboration so CWS is experienced as collaborative in scheduling, decision making, court reports, CFT facilitation
- Improve Family Engagement
  - Preventing recurring maltreatment
  - CFT improvement, consistent invites, strong facilitation, clear next steps, follow up on next steps, use tools consistently
  - Being creative in working with family clusters and intergenerational involvement
  - Improve responsiveness to families
  - Moving through a case when parents refuse to engage, when to promote
  - Navigating families impacted by severe trauma, Navigating manipulation when parents lie.
- Improve Safety Planning
  - Safety planning, improve the quality of safety plans to ensure mitigation of safety
  - Safety planning

#### Other Notes:

- It would be helpful to have the CWS Court Program Manager at these meetings (Nica), as a common struggle is in collaborating and writing court reports.
  - Court reports are written by both the Court Program and the ICWA Program.
- County Counsel is pushing back more about needing more information in court reports. What does the conversation look like between County Counsel and Court Program Staff?

#### Next Steps:

- Continue this work using the same facilitated process at the 8/29 meeting.
- Meet in person on 8/29 from 10-12 at the Plaza Building to continue this work.

Opening Comments:

- Meeting Goal: Prioritize the strategies identified in the last meeting (focused on the SIP goal of responsiveness to Tribal communities and ICWA compliance), select the top two, and develop concrete action steps for each.
- CWS and CCRP had prior discussion around how improving Strategy 1 (Improve Timeliness, Relevance, and Accuracy of Communication and Documentation) and Strategy 3 (Improve Court Collaboration and Decision Making) will naturally improve Strategy 2 (Improving and Understanding Active Efforts).

Notes:

The group was asked which strategies resonated most, with the understanding that only one year remains in the current SIP. They agreed to prioritize Strategies 1 and 3.

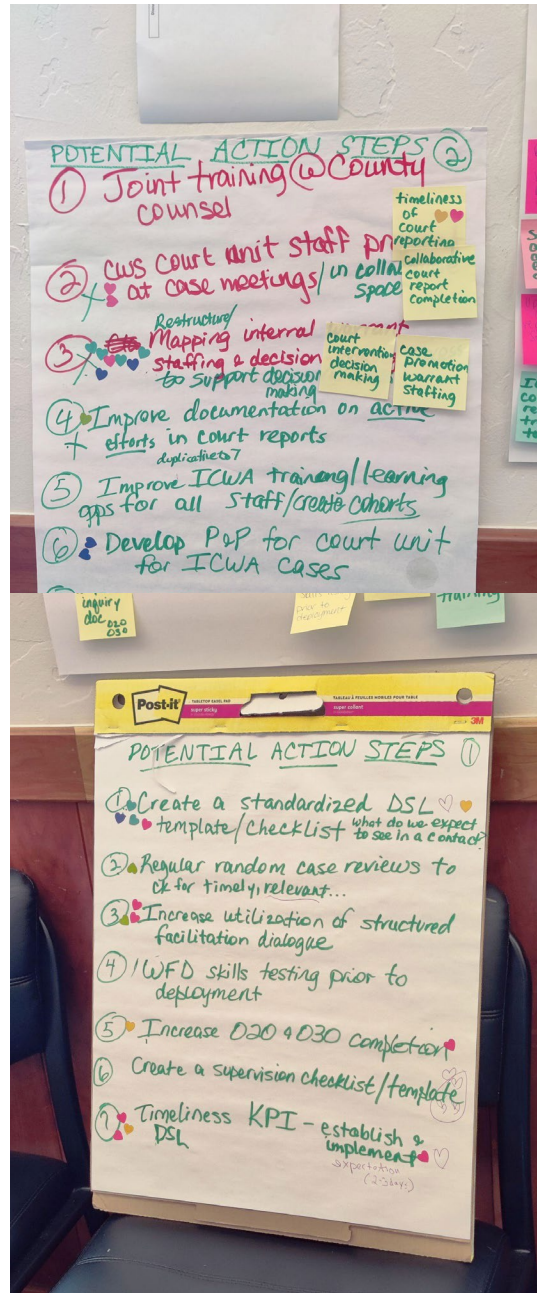
Following the opening discussion, the group began a discussion to sharpen Strategy 3, and then discussion around Strategy 1 followed. While the discussions occurred, Ivy, Dawn, and Kim



worked to log each insight on post it notes and the group worked to identify emerging themes. The Action Steps below were identified from the conversation (in no particular order):

Strategy 3: Improve Court Collaboration and Decision Making

- Joint Trainings with County Counsel
- CWS Court Unit Staff present at case meetings (or in collaborative spaces)
- Restructure / Map internal warrant staffing and decision-making process to support decision making with Tribes
- Improve documentation on active efforts in court reports
- Improve ICWA training / learning opportunities for all staff and create staff cohorts
- Develop policy and practices for Court Unit for ICWA cases
- Develop ICWA court report training template to support and document active efforts



Strategy 1: Improve Timeliness, Relevance, and Accuracy of Communication and Documentation

- Create a standardized DSL template / checklist that includes expectations for contacts
- Regular random case reviews to improve documentation that is timely, relevant, and accurate
- Increase utilization of structured facilitation dialogue
- Workforce Development skills testing prior to deployment
- Increase 020 and 030 completion
- Create a supervision checklist / template
- Establish and Implement a Key Performance Indicator (KPI) for timely DSL entries

The group was then given stickers to rank their top three Action Steps by importance. Stickers could also be placed on any post-it note to indicate that the point should be incorporated into one of the Action Steps.

Below is a summary of the Action Steps and notes from the discussion.

### Strategy 3: Improve Court Collaboration and Decision Making

- 1) Restructure / Map internal warrant staffing and decision-making process to support decision making with Tribes (Score = 7)
  - Decision making isn't structured to support collaboration with Tribes, Tribes are often coordinated with but decisions can change without their input.
- 2) Develop ICWA court report training template to support and document active efforts (Score = 6)
  - Timeliness of Court Reporting (Sticky Note with Score = 2)
  - Court reports aren't being started in a timely manner, Tribes aren't seeing final copies, or their input isn't implemented because they aren't given enough time to provide it. This is an ongoing issue. Tribes that want to write the court reports together with the SWs should be allowed to.
  - Replaced canned language of active efforts in court reports.
- 3) Develop policy and practices for Court Unit for ICWA cases (Score = 2)
  - If Delivered Service Logs (DSLs) and documentation of efforts are improved, the court report will improve. Case collaboration is between a Tribe and an assigned SW. When cases go to court, information is extracted from DSLs and they work with the Tribes on wording and framing.
- 4) CWS Court Unit Staff present at case meetings (or in collaborative spaces) (Score = 2)
  - Examine staffing at case promotion meetings. There are issues with case meetings that include too many people who don't have decision making power around ICWA, such as warrant staff or court unit staff. The current process is rooted in Structured Decision Making (SDM).
  - Not all staff members are exposed to conversations / context at a systems wide level.
- 5) Improve documentation on active efforts in court reports (Score = 1)
  - There is confusion between active and reasonable efforts for CWS staff. A common lens for defining active or passive efforts between both parties is missing.
  - This action step is duplicative of action step 7.
- 6) Joint Trainings with County Counsel (Score = 0)



- Inviting court staff to meetings with the purpose of understanding context for cases. However, there is concern about County Counsel’s communications that have been negatively impactful to Tribes in the past.
  - Feedback from County Counsel can be harsh, it is important to create a positive team environment so that SWs can feel comfortable with feedback, and grow from it.
- 7) Improve ICWA training / learning opportunities for all staff and create staff cohorts (Score = 0)
- There is hesitancy around bringing people outside of the ICWA program to training and workforce development opportunities, due to having not participated in the same level of training and vision work around tribal collaboration.
    - CWS wants to support people on their learning journey if so, but some of this is prerequisite learning that staff have to do.
    - An idea to create cohorts for these workforce development opportunities to keep staff accountable and reduce negative impact. This can also be embedded in the onboarding process.
    - Development opportunities can look like ICWA 101 training, with modules related to honoring sovereignty and changing the lens of working



with Tribes. Also coaching sessions around the gold standard for ICWA work.

- General Notes:

- Key decision making processes have to do with transitioning from a referral into a court case. Court-related decision making is related to county counsel / court unit (court unit is new so this is a good time for this to be elevated as a SIP strategy).

- Issues have arisen where County Counsel won't take a case to court because they don't think there is enough information to support the decision. It should be that the Tribe and the program make the decision on whether the case gets raised to the court, and will work to get additional information if



needed. If they don't have the information needed, how can Tribes and the ICWA program get the judge to make a decision on a case?

- The program is seeing that work goes into these referrals, they are getting promoted, but all the necessary information isn't always being documented.
- The ICWA program is still figuring out what they need to work on for cases to be moved forward, assigned SWs are reviewing and adding information. A lot of work is coming from the courts.
- It is important to acknowledge and agree on the amount of work that can be done in the last year of the current SIP, and if warranted, some strategies or action steps could carry over to the next SIP. Action steps need to be attainable for the current SIP. The SIP needs to go to the BOS, and the CWS Director can't agree to a plan that is unrealistic.

- It is important for CWS and ICWA programs to do what is in their power in order to facilitate a better workflow with County Counsel. The programs can work to create stronger reports in order to get less pushback and not get impeded by County Counsel.

Strategy 1: Improve Timeliness, Relevance, and Accuracy of Communication and Documentation

- 1) Create a standardized DSL template / checklist that includes expectations for contacts (Score = 6)
- 2) Establish and implement a Key Performance Indicator (KPI) for timely DSL entries (Score = 5)
  - Could look like 80% completion of entries within 3 days.
- 3) Create a supervision checklist / template (Score = 4)
  - Supervisors will know what is missing in DSLs and will be able to conduct reviews.
  - This will also help outside staff understand what is happening during supervision.
- 4) Increase utilization of structured facilitation dialogue (Score = 3)
  - There is a desire to have better structured CFTs, oftentimes supports aren't invited to the meetings. Also there should be clear next steps on who does what by when. CFTs should have clear agendas that focus on safety concerns.
  - Having a strong facilitator can really help these CFTs, and facilitators are in high need. It is important for the facilitator to be a neutral party, as balancing roles can be tough for Tribal SWs. Staff have been trained on CFT facilitation before, it is important to ensure forms being used and expectations around facilitation align.

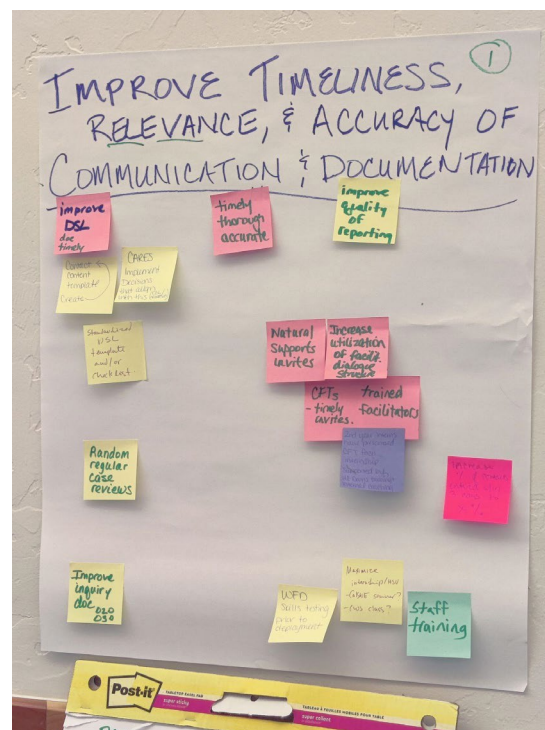


The facilitator should also be inviting natural supports, getting a meeting link out in a timely manner, and being clear about who is organizing the meeting.

- Could second year interns have prescribed CFT facilitation internship using UC Davis training and internal coaching.
  - Maximize internship opportunities through Cal Poly Humboldt [could look like Cal Social Work Education (CalSWEC) seminar or CWS class].
- 5) Increase ICWA 020 and 030 completion (Score = 2)
- 6) Regular random case reviews to improve documentation that is timely, relevant, and accurate (Score = 1)
- To ensure continuous quality improvement.
- 7) Workforce Development skills testing prior to deployment (Score = 0)
- A point was raised about how Cal Poly MSW graduates are needing robust mentoring/training in order to take on full caseloads. Currently getting the same training that SW I, II and IIIs get.

Next Steps:

- CWS and CCRP translate the strategies and action steps from these meeting minutes into a worksheet in the format of the State SIP, where the group can finalize the strategies and action steps.

Love Your Neighborhood Program

#### SERVICE PROVIDER

McKinleyville Community Collaborative – Family Resource Center

#### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The McKinleyville Community Collaborative is the lead agency for the county's 16 family resource centers, and was awarded Child Abuse Prevention, Intervention and Treatment (CAPIT) funds, with input from community stakeholders, including public and private non-profit agencies, the Child Abuse Prevention Coordinating Council (CAPCC), and consumers, in order to provide services to at-risk children and families, in accordance with CAPIT state guidelines. CAPIT funds are to provide preventative child abuse services through the Love Your Neighborhood Program by building family leadership capacities within communities centered on five key protective factors: parental resilience, concrete supports in times of need, social and emotional competence of children, social connections, and parental knowledge of child development and parenting. Families and individuals living in the apartment complexes are contacted by the Collaborative's full-time program coordinator and engaged to participate in the Love Your Neighborhood Program.

The program coordinator provides one-on-one interviews with the residents to identify their needs, level of stability and risk factors and strengths. Referrals are made to the McKinleyville Family Resource Center for case management and to other community-based service providers and resources as needed. Also, trainings are provided to interested residents on identifying an area of need for themselves and their residential complex to promote community leadership centered on the five protective factors of the Love Your Neighborhood program.

The program coordinator is in the community on a weekly basis (often a few times per week) and when activities and meetings are being held. Residents are supported in organizing and implementing on-site programming, such as exercise classes, book reading club, and community composting/gardening. Furthermore, the program offers opportunities for parents to gain understanding of typical child development, age-appropriate expectations for children, and screen for early mental health challenges or developmental delays. One of the tools used to support this is the Ages and Stages Questionnaire.

#### FUNDING SOURCES

Child Abuse Prevention, Intervention, and Treatment (CAPIT) funds of \$75,000 are contractually allocated to this program for fiscal years 21/22 through 26/27 with the option to renew for additional years. The funded service provider will assure that the agency shall demonstrate the existence of a 10 percent cash or in-kind match, other than funding provided by the State Department of Social Services.

### **PRIORITY NEED OUTLINED IN CSA**

Based on the 2022 County Self-Assessment (CSA) and stakeholder/focus group feedback identified in Section 12 (Summary of Findings p. 185) of the CSA, the following needs are targeted by CAPIT funding:

- Completing comprehensive and global safety assessments, and not solely focusing on the current allegations.
- Funding to support Family Resource Centers and Child Welfare Services (CWS) prevention services.
- Many unmet needs for cross-system youth, especially with regards to mental health.
- Increased training/support to Substitute Care Providers (SCPs) around their role in reunification.
- Involvement by the consumer (parents, families, communities) must be part of core services and consumer feedback a requirement.
- Expanding community mentor programs for youth and peer groups for teens.
- Increasing awareness of available services.

### **TARGET POPULATION**

Target population consists of low-income individuals and families, with an emphasis on at-risk children and families, who are residents of two designated low-income housing complexes. This is a community-based program that supports neighborhood connections and involvement through one-on-one interviews, where residents identify strengths and opportunities to work together toward creating a caring and thriving community. Neighbors work together to promote leadership and building strong connections between family and community to create a safe and supportive environment for children and their families. Up to 50 residents may be interviewed and up to 25 residents trained in a resident-identified area of need. Additional apartment complex partners will be eligible in subsequent years.

### **TARGET GEOGRAPHIC AREA**

Area of service includes residents of Courtyard Apartments in Arcata and Redwood Creek Apartments in McKinleyville, located about six to 12 miles north of Eureka.

**TIMELINE**

Humboldt County Department of Health and Human Services contracted with the family resource center, McKinleyville Community Collaborative, for fiscal years 2021/22 through 2026/27, in order to provide preventative child abuse services through the Love Your Neighborhood Program.

**Program Outcome(s) and Measurement:**

The purpose of the Love Your Neighborhood program is to increase children’s social and emotional development, to increase parent’s knowledge of parenting and child development, and to empower families to identify/develop a support network in times of need through increased social connections, thus increasing child/family resiliency. Families referred to case management services, through the Love Your Neighborhood Program, are requested to complete an interview questionnaire, which is the Family Development Model outcome tool, for measuring risk factors and level of stability (before and after services delivery). Two residents are to be trained in administering the Ages and Stages Questionnaire to resident children (ages 1 month to 5.5 years of age), designed to screen and assess developmental performance of children in the areas of communication, gross/fine motor skills, problem solving, and personal-social skills.

## Appendix A

### **Quality Assurance Monitoring:**

The DHHS CAPIT liaison and the McKinleyville Community Collaborative have face-to-face contact at least semi-annually to review goals and monitor progress. The contractor is required to capture service and client data as described in the contract's scope of services and provided in the end-of-year report to DHHS. This reporting is distributed to CWS program management to review the effectiveness of the program and determine service delivery and training needs. The performance goal of the program is to see an increase in at least two of the assessment categories in Family Development Model outcome scores from the first assessment to the second assessment. It has been learned so far that the program has shown to be successful in engaging residents especially if the residential complex has a community gathering space on site and is locally managed which facilitates communication and coordination.

### **Client Satisfaction:**

The McKinleyville Community Collaborative family advocates are directly involved with the clients and are able to speak to clients about satisfaction with the services provided. Client comments may then be brought for discussion by the Community Collaborative Coordinator to the regular annual CAPIT meeting with CWS and Probation representatives. At this time no client satisfaction survey is being used, however CWS and McKinleyville Community Collaborative, with technical assistance from CDSS, would be willing to explore options for implementing a client survey where it is deemed needed.

This includes selecting, training and implementing practices with fidelity and tracking of outcomes associated with intervention using standardized outcome measurement tools and practicing care management at the service level to ensure that multiple services are delivered in a coordinated and therapeutic manner and that children and their families can move through the system of services in accordance with their changing needs. This also includes providing developmentally appropriate mental health services and supports that promote optimal social and emotional outcomes for young children and their families in their homes and community children zero (0) to five (5) years of age and providing developmentally appropriate services and supports to facilitate the transition of youth eighteen (18) to twenty-one (21) years of age to adulthood and to the transition age youth and adult service systems as needed. RCAA will collaborate with Humboldt County CWS and families participating in the PACT program to develop and provide the following housing assistance service plans:

1. A Housing Action Plan detailing strategies, objectives, and goals that are designed to enable participating families to achieve permanent housing as quickly as possible. The Housing Action Plans shall include all of the following action items: searching for housing; viewing housing; interviewing with landlords; and filling out applications for housing. These action items must be identified and updated on a weekly basis.
2. A Family Plan describing services provided to the participating family, and each individual member thereof, with a timeline for specific tasks within the plan as well as a timeline for plan completion. The Family Plans shall include any Reunification or CalWORKs Plans developed by County for the participating family, life skills classes the participating family will be required to attend, and a review of the participating family's outstanding debts.
3. A Discharge Plan describing the participating family's readiness for discharge, aftercare needs and resources, and strategies to retain permanent housing.

As part of the PACT program, RCAA will also provide various support and aftercare services designed to assist participating families with maintaining permanent housing.

Depending on the children and families' needs, adoption promotion and support services may involve pre- and post-adoptive services. Recruitment and Support of Adoptive Families and Promoting Youth Permanency focuses in part on pre-adoptive family support services (e.g. concurrent family planning, facilitating adoption finalization, negotiating Adoption Assistance Program rates, and adoption court hearing activities) and partly on post-adoptive families (e.g. providing crisis intervention, family counseling, and linkage to local resources).

**Pre-adoptive services** help children/youth and families prepare for the changes that come with adoption and develop life-skills for permanency and stability. Pre-adoptive services may include recruitment of adoptive parents and foster families to be adoptive parents since most adoptive parents start out as foster families. Other pre-adoptive services may consist of adoption related child assessment/screening, mental health counseling for children/families, Livescan fees, and services designed to expedite the adoption process. CWS social workers will continue to make sure that placements made throughout the life of the case involve concurrent permanency planning.

Social workers observe the families’ use of PSSF provided services. All requests for PSSF funds are reviewed by the social worker’s supervisor. The C&FS program manager reviews all PSSF requests and the deputy director reviews all requests above \$250. County purchased services are invoiced to DHHS Financial Services Unit

**Quality Assurance and Peer Review:**

CWS program managers and Fiscal Services staff meet annually to discuss the budget and service delivery. Fiscal also can generate a report of PSSF funded services provided to families, based on work orders received for client reimbursement and case worker time study claim codes. The county measures service effectiveness and performance outcomes by social workers observing the progress status of pre-adoptive families.
