


Methodology

- 400 telephone interviews with Humboldt County voters likely to participate in the November 2016 election
- Conducted April 24-26, 2016 via landline and cell phones
- Margin of sampling error +/-4.9% at the 95% confidence interval
- Due to rounding, some percentages do not add up to 100%
- Selected comparisons to 2014 community survey






Community Context

Voters are more optimistic about life in the County than 8 years ago.


Would you say things in Humboldt County are going in the right direction, or are they off on the wrong track?






Majorities approve of County government.

These perceptions have changed little from 2014.




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Meth, crime, homelessness and insufficient mental health services are top concerns.


Concern about road conditions has increased significantly compared with prior years.


Nearly three in five see a "great need" for more local funding.

Measure Language Tested


Humboldt County Commercial Marijuana Cultivation Measure. To maintain and improve essential services, including:

- Public safety, road repairs and parks;
- Crime investigation/prosecution;
- Children's mental health services;
- Environmental cleanup/restoration; and
- Other County services,

Shall Humboldt County establish a graduated, annual commercial marijuana cultivation tax of \$1 to \$12 per square foot, based upon grow type and size, generating approximately \$14.1 million annually until ended by voters, all revenue for the County, none for the State, annual audits, public review?

Three-quarters of voters support a commercial marijuana cultivation measure.

If there were an election today, do you think you would vote "yes" in favor of this measure or "no" to oppose it?







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The measure is supported by majorities of all major demographic and geographic subgroups, including:

- Men and women;
- Democrats, Republicans and independents;
- Older and younger voters;
- White voters and voters of color; and
- Voters with and without college degrees.




Regardless of ties to the marijuana economy support is high.






Support is remarkably high in each of the County's major cities, and in Districts 3 and 4.

Respondents then heard a detailed explanation of the measure.


Starting in February of this year, businesses growing medical marijuana in the unincorporated portions of Humboldt County are now required to acquire marijuana cultivation permits. This measure would apply an annual tax on marijuana grown for commercial cultivation, but would not apply to medical marijuana grown for personal use. This tax would also apply to the commercial cultivation of recreational marijuana, should California legalize recreational marijuana in the future.

This annual tax would be based upon estimated commercial yields for the type of grow operation and overall size of the cultivated area, ranging from \$1 to \$12 per square foot. Smaller grows would pay lower rates and larger grows would pay higher rates. Also, indoor grows – which consume more energy and can be harvested more frequently – will pay more than equivalently sized outdoor or mixed-light grows, and equivalently sized mixed-light grows will pay more than outdoor grows.

The County currently estimates that a somewhat average-sized outdoor grow of 5,000 square feet would pay about \$14,000 a year under this tax, and that the overall tax would generate approximately \$14.1 million per year for the County. Revenues generated by this tax would go into the County's General Fund and be available to fund essential County services, such as road repair, parks and public safety, as well as services directly related to marijuana cultivation and use, such as environmental cleanup and restoration, crime investigation and prosecution, and children's mental health services.



Support is just as high as it was initially.






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
Measure Provisions

While respondents supported environmental cleanup most strongly, all spending categories were broadly favored.






Respondents expressed support for graduated tax rates.





Extending the tax to recreational marijuana is also popular.




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
Spending Priorities for a Measure

Addressing environmental impacts of marijuana and improving children's services rank highly.






One-third or more see roads, public safety and veterans services as extremely important.
