

DISCUSSION:

The Board of State and Community Correction (BSCC) is the Designated State Administrative Agency for the following two federal juvenile justice funding sources: Title II Formula Grant Program and the Juvenile Accountability Block Grant Program (JABG). The State Advisory Committee on Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (SACJJDP) aligned these programs to support California's Title II Three-Year plan. The plan outlines three priority areas: Reducing Racial and Ethnic Disparity (RED); Evidence Based Practices; and strategies to support positive outcomes for youth, their families, and communities. The legislative mandates associated with the BSCC also direct the Board to support statewide efforts in implementing evidence-based practices.

To support the Three-Year plan, the SACJJDP approved \$250,000 in discretionary JABG funds to further develop the EBP priority area. The SACJJDP recommended that the BSCC board oversee the development of a Request for Application (RFA) to identify probation departments that are prepared to receive training that will assist them in implementing or expanding the use of evidence-based practices within their local juvenile justice communities. The RFA was released on November 14, 2014, and Humboldt County responded with submission of a proposal. On July 9, 2016 the SACJJDP approved another \$190,000 in JABG funding and it was announced that another round of funding would be available under this grant, the RFA for which was released August 17, 2016.

Funding for the EBP Training Project is to be used to support probation departments in training around the use of evidence-based practices within juvenile corrections. Specifically, this project is intended to help fund training for probation staff and their juvenile justice partners (i.e. child welfare, behavioral health, mental health, judiciary, education, public health, social services, nonprofit community based organizations, law enforcement, the faith community, etc.) and/or community stakeholders to increase skills, competency, and proficiency in implementing effective correctional practices that promote rehabilitation and are known to reduce recidivism.

Probation departments were required to be the lead agency for this project, and applications could be made for an individual department or multiple departments in a joint or regional application. Agencies submitting joint applications were allowed to apply for the combined funding amount for all counties included in the application, ranging from \$5,000 to \$20,000 based on the size of each county. Humboldt joined with 13 other probation departments in northern California and applied for a combined total of \$75,000. The department was awarded for a 14 month cycle beginning May 1, 2015 and ending June 30, 2016. The counties partnering in this project include Butte, Colusa, Del Norte, Glenn, Humboldt, Lassen, Mendocino, Modoc, Plumas, Shasta, Sierra, Siskiyou, Tehama, and Trinity. For the second round of funding Humboldt will also be partnering with these same counties and applying once again for the combined total of \$75,000.

The focus of the proposal is to offer training by Dr. Paula Smith focusing on two particular subjects:

Introductory Corrections Training which provides participants with an overview of evidence-based practices in corrections and an introduction to the principles of effective intervention. Specifically, participants will acquire a solid understanding of the principles of risk, need, and responsivity (RNR framework), as well as the importance of continuous quality improvement. In addition, participants will be introduced to the core skills needed to support offender change. This training is relevant for all corrections practitioners working with offenders.

Advanced Case Management which will teach participants advanced skills related to the development of case plans for offenders. Specific topics will include: (1) a brief review of the RNR framework and core components of case plans; (2) how to translate the results of assessments into case plans by identifying needs, defining target behaviors, developing goals, and constructing detailed objectives and strategies; (3) how to prioritize need domains over the course of supervision; (4) how to measure progress and verify the acquisition of target behaviors; (5) how to use advanced skills (e.g., role clarification and contingency management) in contact sessions; (6) how to address specific responsivity factors in case plans (e.g., trauma-informed approaches, gender responsive strategies); and (7) the importance of self-care for corrections practitioners. This training will include several opportunities to practice skills. Participants will also be provided with numerous practical resources and aids to assist in the development of case plans. This training build on the skills Probation Officers gained going through the case management training provided under this grant last year by University of Cincinnati.

Each training will be offered both on the coast for coastal counties and inland for non-coastal counties partnering in this grant.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no county general fund impact. The \$75,000 grant has not been included in the proposed 2016/17 fiscal year budget and a supplemental budget for this funding is attached. The revenue will fall into line item 1100-235-515025 and the expenses will be paid from contract services, 1100-235-2325. Expenses associated with this grant will take place in fiscal year 2016/17 and in fiscal year 2017/18 as the grant period ends February 2018. A minimum cash match of 10% is required from grant applicants. The Probation Department's budgeted training funds and in-kind match for administrative activities will meet all match requirements.

This grant supports the Board's Strategic Framework components of building inter-jurisdictional and regional cooperation and seeking outside funding sources to benefit Humboldt County's needs.

University of Cincinnati School of Criminal Justice - Paula Smith, PhD and staff would provide two specific trainings. First, a 1-day (8 hour) "Evidence-Based Practices in Corrections" training would be offered to for new sworn probation staffs as well as stakeholders. This is meant to give an overview of evidence-informed practices used in the correctional field to provide a foundation for subsequent training on specific EBP assessment tools, supportive practices and cognitive behavioral interventions. This training would have one offering for coastal counties and two offerings for inland counties. Second, a structured 2-day (16 hours) "Case Management, Case Planning and Contingency Management" training would be offered to seasoned sworn probation staffs. This particular training is meant to provide knowledge and practical experience at integrating risk assessment information, offender responsivity factors, targeted interventions and effective case work with an offender to reduce likelihood to recidivate.

Total Professional Services = \$78,500 (state funds \$75,000, plus county match of \$3,500)

The Humboldt County Probation Department will administer the grant, coordinate and execute a contract with the trainer, coordinate regional training offerings, submit required grant paperwork for STC certification, and prepare and submit all required fiscal and progress reports to the Board of State and Community Corrections. A figure of \$5,772 for administrative staff time is offered as match, based on an indirect cost rate of 7.696 % times the state grant funds amount (\$75,000).

SECTION II: PROJECT NEED AND DESCRIPTION

Need for the training project in serving juvenile offenders: The Chief Probation Officers of California (CPOC) north region is comprised of 14 mostly rural counties; thirteen are 'small' counties and one is a 'medium' sized county according to RFP parameters. Due to our size, isolation, rural county budgets, and often minimal staffing, it is often quite challenging to arrange and afford quality training from experts in the field of juvenile justice and related best or evidence-based practices. A regional approach will allow us to combine resources and capitalize on our well-established historical partnerships to secure nationally recognized training. Most of the counties have experienced significant hiring in the last year, so training on Corrections 101 is intended to provide an overview of evidence-based practices in corrections and an introduction to the principles of effective intervention for new sworn probation staffs and stakeholders.

Advanced Case Management is intended to teach advanced skills related to the development of case plans for offenders for seasoned sworn probation staffs.

How the training project serves as an intervention to the need: The EBPP grant funds will support contracting with the University Of Cincinnati School Of Criminal Justice (UC-SCJ) to provide STC certified training to region Probation staffs, as well as local stakeholders. The region chiefs have agreed to offer training at centralized locations on both the coast and inland for best accessibility of the partnering counties (i.e., in Humboldt and Shasta/Tehama).

Training design, credentials of the provider, steps, procedures and services that will be delivered: The focus of the training offered by the UC-SCJ was developed by Dr. Paula Smith and associates. Two separate trainings will be offered:

- A one-day training will cover general evidence-based principles and practices utilized in the field of corrections. Specifically, participants will acquire a solid understanding of the principles of risk, need, and responsivity (RNR framework), as well as the importance of continuous quality improvement. In addition, participants will be introduced to the core skills needed to support offender change. This training is relevant for all corrections practitioners working with offenders. Although this training session is interactive and incorporates a number of practical exercises, it can accommodate larger numbers of trainees.
- A two-day training will focus on advanced case management skills. Specific topics will include: (1) a brief review of the RNR framework and core components of case plans; (2) how to translate the results of assessments into case plans by identifying needs, defining target behaviors, developing goals, and constructing detailed objectives and strategies; (3) how to prioritize need domains over the course of supervision; (4) how to measure progress and verify the acquisition of target behaviors; (5) how to use advanced skills (e.g., role clarification and contingency management) in contact sessions; (6) how to address specific responsivity factors in case plans (e.g., trauma-informed approaches, gender responsive strategies); and (7) the importance of self-care for corrections practitioners. This training will include several opportunities to practice skills.

 Participants will also be provided with numerous practical resources and aids to assist in the development of case plans. This training can accommodate up to thirty trainees.

SECTION III: HOW THE TRAINING PROJECT SUPPORTS EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICES

Region's system-wide plan currently in place for implementing EBP...: The Northern CA Probation Consortium (NCPC) was formed by 15 counties in 2008 to contract for Assessments.com tools, training and mutual support in EBP implementation. Though the counties have since contracted with multiple different risk assessment tool providers and have implemented different specific evidence-based cognitive behavioral interventions, the NCPC continues to seek multi-county training and provide support in the implementation of EBPs, generally.

Additionally, the Humboldt County Probation Department underwent an organizational EBP implementation assessment using the Correctional Program Checklist-Community Supervision Agency with UC-CJR in 2012. The Department has taken the results of that assessment and conducted system-wide training in our EBPs, and has modified its internal policies and practices to better support EBP implementation, monitoring and evaluation. Further, the Department has contracted with Humboldt State University to assist the Department in the evaluation of various EBPs implemented.

The nexus between the (EBP) progress made to date...and need for training requested: The regional partners for this proposal agreed that their departments are experiencing similar gaps and needs in their EBP implementation. Specifically, new staffs could benefit from an overview of evidence-based practices in corrections and an introduction to the principles of effective intervention to lay a foundation for subsequent EBP-related training. More experienced staffs demonstrate a need for further development of advanced skills related to effective risk-based case management. These staffs have a solid understanding of how to conduct risk assessments and develop initial case plans, but could benefit from additional training in how to effectively manage and prioritize an individual's case plan objectives over time with proper consideration of

responsivity factors. Also, development of greater skill in accurately measuring offender progress and verifying their acquisition of target behaviors, and responding appropriately to reinforce those behaviors through contingency management during contacts would be beneficial. Finally, the intensive work with offenders has stressed the need for instruction in proper self care for officers as well.

How the need for the training requested related to promoting rehabilitation and reducing recidivism through EBPs: Training on general evidence-based principles and practices in corrections will form the foundation for effective case work and provide the framework that should allow for better integration of risk assessment, case planning/management and interventions with offenders. Training advanced skills involved in all aspects of case planning and ongoing case management is critical to the promotion of effective offender rehabilitation.

Both of these will directly lead to improved outcomes for youths, equating to reduced recidivism.

Research demonstrating that the requested training is grounded in EBPs: The body of research by doctors Smith, Latessa, Gendreau, Lowencamp and the other faculty of UC-SCJ on risk/needs assessment and effective corrections interventions is extensive and well-documented.

SECTION IV: COLLABORATION

The region's probation departments are the principle target for the UC-SCJ training – including Butte, Colusa, Del Norte, Glenn, Humboldt, Lassen, Mendocino, Modoc, Plumas, Shasta, Sierra, Siskiyou, Tehama and Trinity counties. Education, court and juvenile justice partners and service providers from each county would be invited to attend the Corrections 101 training.
