GRANT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF HUMBOLDT, HEADWATERS FUND AND SEQUOIA PARK ZOO FOUNDATION

Contract #17-GF-01

This Agreement is made and entered into this 16th day of January, 2018 by and between the County of Humboldt, Headwaters Fund, a political subdivision of the State of California (hereinafter called "the County") and the Sequoia Park Zoo Foundation, a nonprofit corporation located in Humboldt County, California (hereinafter called "the Grantee"), together referred to as "the Parties".

WHEREAS, the Grantee has applied for funding through the Headwaters Grant Fund competitive awards process; and

WHEREAS, the Grantee's proposed project supports the Headwaters Grant Fund's mission and funding priorities of facilitating economic development for Humboldt County; and

WHEREAS, on December 12, 2017 the Headwaters Fund Board ("HFB") recommended the Grantee's proposed project for Headwaters Grant Fund funding; and

WHEREAS, on January 16, 2018 the Humboldt County Board of Supervisors ("Board") approved the Grantee's proposed project for Headwaters Grant Fund funding; and

WHEREAS, HFB and Board are willing to fund the project on the terms and conditions set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto mutually agree as follows:

I. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

A. Grantee shall utilize the grant funds for a funding feasibility study and marketing and video production for donor recruitment (the "Project"). The specific tasks to be carried out are set forth in Exhibit A- Scope of Work and Exhibit B (Grantee's grant proposal), both of which are attached hereto and incorporated in full herein.

II. AWARD AMOUNT AND DISBURSEMENT

- A. County agrees to pay Grantee from the Headwaters Fund a sum not to exceed Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) to cover Grantee's costs in carrying out this part of the Project. Costs for labor and materials shall be as set forth in the Project Budget attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein full by reference. Grantee shall bear the responsibility for any Project costs in excess of \$30,000.
- B. Grantee shall submit an itemized invoice, no less frequently than quarterly and no more frequently than monthly, to the County itemizing all work completed and costs incurred as of the invoice date. Eligible expenses include Project costs beginning on the Agreement date listed above and ending at the termination date of this Agreement. The invoice will utilize Funds Request Form (Exhibit D) and reference relevant sections and categories of

Project Budget (Exhibit C). Payment for work performed will be made within thirty (30) days after receipt of the invoice. Although payment will customarily be made in arrears, Grantee may request prospective payment. Prospective payments must be approved in writing by the Humboldt County Auditor (or his designee), and shall be supported by written justification.

- C. Ten percent (10%) of the total grant amount specified in Section II-A above will not be released to Grantee until Grantee submits the Final Report (see Section V(A)(3)) for the Project.
- D. No later than forty-five (45) days after expenditure of all grant funds, or completion of the Project, whichever is sooner, Grantee shall submit adequate written documentation summarizing all costs incurred in connection with performance of services under this Agreement.
- E. Any unspent funds shall be returned to the County with no negative consequences for future grant applications as long as all reasonable efforts were made to execute the Project within the Project Budget (Exhibit C) in a timely manner.

F. Matching Funds

- 1. Grantee has documented that required grant matching funds (outlined in Project Budget, Exhibit C) have been received for the Project.
- 2. If Grantee determines that Project funding from other source(s) can no longer be used, County's funding may be reduced, suspended, or terminated. Grantee must contact Headwaters Fund Executive Director immediately under such conditions.
- G. If Grantee deviates by more than six months from the Project timeline dates outlined in Exhibit A, the Headwaters Fund Board shall have the discretion to modify, terminate, or disencumber unspent funds from the grant.

III. GRANT MODIFICATIONS

- A. Deviations of any single category proposed in the line item budget must receive written approval of the County at the following levels of approval:
 - 1. Headwaters Fund Executive Director may adjust changes in grant timelines, activities, and partners that are consistent with original Project goals, target populations, and geographical focus. Headwaters Fund Executive Director may approve budget changes under \$10,000.
 - 2. The Headwaters Fund Board must approve changes in Project goals, target population, and geographic focus. Budget changes of \$10,000 or more require Headwaters Fund Board approval.
- B. If additional time beyond the timeline provided by the Grantee (listed in Exhibit A) is required and exceptional circumstances warrant, a formal request must be submitted to the Headwaters Fund Executive Director. The request must be submitted at least forty-five (45) days prior to the expiration date of the grant. The request must explain the need for the extension and include an estimate of the unobligated funds remaining and a plan for their use. Unobligated funds remaining at the expiration of the grant is not sufficient justification for an extension. The plan must adhere to the previously approved objectives of the Project.

IV. GRANT REPORTING AND AUDITING

A. Reporting

- 1. Grantee will submit Quarterly Reports to Headwaters Staff. Each of these reports covers three months of the calendar year and is due thirty days after the end of the quarter (April 30, July 31, October 31, January 31). Reporting will begin after the first full quarter after the start date of the contract (i.e. if the contract start date is February 1, the first Quarterly Report is not due until July 31). Quarterly reports will utilize the format in Exhibit E and shall include:
 - i. Documentation of activities contracted and completed with grant funds;
 - ii. Financial accountings of grant funds. Grant funds should be tracked separately. Receipts documenting purchases may be requested;
 - iii. Subcontracts signed and/or completed;
 - iv. Narrative of accomplishments to date and schedule of activities and expected completion date;
 - v. Progress on meeting match requirements and fundraising activity report; and
 - vi. Requests for revisions of timeline, budget, and other Project items.
- 2. County Staff may review any records or documents pertinent to the Project at any time. Such records include information about the Grantee's organization and budget.
- 3. A Final Report, describing the work accomplished during the entire period of the Agreement, shall be submitted to County no later than the thirtieth (30th) day of the month following the Agreement's termination date. The Final Report will follow the format of Quarterly Reports (Exhibit E) and also include a Grant Evaluation (see Section VI and Exhibit F). County may require Grantee to report on other Project activities, processes, and outcomes as needed in the Final Report.
- 4. County will send a Grant Closeout letter to Grantee after the Final Report. When Grantee returns the letter, the grant is considered closed.

B. Auditing

- 1. Grantee shall retain, and County Staff shall have access to, any pertinent books, documents, papers and records of the Grantee organization (and of the performing organization, if different) to make audits, examinations, excerpts and transcripts for up to four (4) years after grant termination date. County Staff and its representatives may conduct periodic site visits to review the effectiveness of the grant.
- 2. Grantee agrees to timely prepare and maintain accurate and complete financial and performance records for a minimum of four (4) years from the date of final payment under this Agreement or until all pending County, State, and Federal audits are completed, whichever is later. The books and records shall be original entry books with a general ledger itemizing all debits and credits for the work.
- 3. Grantee shall maintain detailed payroll records. Grantee agrees to maintain such records locally and make them available for inspection by County Staff and representatives, during normal business hours, upon one (1) working day notice.
- 4. Grantee will permit the County to audit all books, account or records relating to this Agreement for the purpose of compliance with applicable audit requirements relative to this Agreement. Grantee shall provide the County with any relevant information

- required and shall permit access to its premises during normal business hours upon five (5) days' notice.
- 5. In the event of an audit exception or exceptions, the party responsible for not meeting the program requirement or requirements shall be responsible for the deficiency and for the cost of the audit. If Grantee is the party responsible for the deficiency, the cost of the audit and the deficiency shall be paid by Grantee within thirty (30) days of notice.
- 6. Grantee assures that it maintains appropriate internal financial controls over grant funds received and disbursed, including procedures for authorizing disbursements, tracking grant expenditures, and reporting grant revenue and expenditures.
- 7. The County's rights and obligations under this provision shall continue after termination of the Agreement until December 31, 2019. In the event the term of this grant is extended under Paragraph III of this Agreement, the County's rights and obligations under this provision shall be extended for the same period of time.

V. GRANT EVALUATION

- A. At the completion of the Project, Grantee will complete a self-evaluation for the Project using the Project Evaluation Form (Exhibit F). The self-evaluation will be part of the Project's Final Report, and due no later than the thirtieth (30th) day of the month following the Agreement's termination date. County may require Grantee to present Project overview, results, and evaluation to the Headwaters Fund Board. County representatives may also conduct site visits to the Grantee and its Project for the purpose of grant evaluation. County may modify Project evaluation requirements as needed during the Project.
- B. Grantee shall submit quarterly reports and a Final Report to County as specified in Section V(A).
- C. In connection with the Headwaters Fund's mission to facilitate economic development for Humboldt County, Headwaters Fund Staff may conduct follow-up interviews with Grantee after the grant has been closed and/or the termination of this Agreement in order to evaluate the Project's long-term results, outcomes, and effectiveness in supporting the Headwaters Fund's purpose. Grantee agrees to be interviewed and shall cooperate and respond to any requests for information from Headwaters Fund Staff.

VI. FUNDER RECOGNITION AND MEDIA RELEASE

- A. Grantee shall identify The Headwaters Fund as a support organization on all published material relating to the subject matter of the award.
- B. Grantee shall provide information in a timely manner and otherwise cooperate with the County in completing Headwaters Fund reports on grants and other documents related to grants. This cooperation may include Grantee attendance at events publicizing Headwaters Fund grants.
- C. All press releases and informational material related to this Agreement shall receive approval from the County prior to being released to the media (television, radio, newspapers, Internet). In addition, Grantee shall inform the County of requests for interviews by media related to this Agreement prior to such interviews taking place. The County reserves the right to have a representative present at such interviews.
- D. Grantee must abide by the specific requirements in the Headwaters Fund Recognition Policy attached as Exhibit G.

VII. INSURANCE REOUIREMENTS:

- A. This Contract shall not be executed by County and the Grantee is not entitled to any rights, unless certificates of insurances (or other sufficient proof that the following provisions have been complied with) and such certificate(s) are filed with the Clerk of the Humboldt County Board of Supervisors.
- B. Without limiting Grantee's indemnification obligations provided for herein, Grantee shall take out and maintain and shall require any of its subcontractors to take out and maintain, throughout the period of this Agreement and any extended term thereof, the following policies of insurance placed with insurers authorized to do business in California and with a current A.M. Best rating of no less than A:VII or its equivalent against injury/death to persons or damage to property which may arise from or in connection with the activities hereunder of Grantee, its agents, officers, directors employees, licensees, invitees, assignees or subcontractors:
 - 1. Comprehensive or Commercial General Liability Insurance at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability coverage (occurrence form CG 0001), in an amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence for any one incident, including, personal injury, death and property damage. If a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this Project or the general aggregate shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
 - 2. Automobile/Motor Liability Insurance with a limit of liability not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) combined single limit coverage. Such insurance shall include coverage of all owned, hired and non-owned vehicles. Said coverage shall be at least as broad as Insurance Service Offices Form Code 1 (any auto).

OR

As stated in Exhibit A – Scope of Services, CONTRACTOR will not drive an' automobile in the performance of services for COUNTY. If that changes, CONTRACTOR will take out and maintain Automobile/Motor Liability Insurance with a limit of liability not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) combined single limit coverage. Such insurance shall include coverage of all owned, hired and nonowned vehicles. Said coverage shall be at least as broad as Insurance Service Offices Form Code 1 (any auto).

- 3. Workers Compensation and Employers Liability Insurance providing workers' compensation benefits as required by the Labor Code of the State of California. Said policy shall contain or be endorsed to contain a waiver of subrogation against County, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers. In all cases, the above insurance shall include Employers Liability coverage with limits of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per accident for bodily injury and disease.
- 4. Professional Liability Insurance/Errors and Omission Coverage including coverage in an amount no less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for each occurrence (Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) general aggregate). Said insurance shall be maintained for the statutory period during which the professional may be exposed to liability. Contractor shall require that the aforementioned professional liability insurance coverage language be incorporated into its contract with any other entity with which it contracts for professional services.

- C. <u>Special Insurance Requirements</u>. Said policies shall unless otherwise specified herein be endorsed with, the following provisions:
 - 1. The Comprehensive General Liability Policy shall provide that the County, its officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers, are covered as additional insured for liability arising out of the operations performed by or on behalf of Grantee. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to the County, its officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers. Said policy shall also contain a provision stating that such coverage:
 - i. Includes contractual liability
 - ii. Does not contain exclusions as to loss or damage to property caused by explosion or resulting from collapse of buildings or structures or damage to property underground, commonly referred to "XCU Hazards"
 - iii. Is primary insurance with regards to County of Humboldt
 - iv. Does not contain a pro-rata, excess only, and/or escape clause
 - v. Contains a cross liability, severability of interest or separation of insureds clause
 - 2. The policies shall not be canceled, non-renewed or materially reduced in coverage without thirty (30) days prior written notice being provided to County and in accordance with the Notice provisions set forth under Section XI. It is further understood that Grantee shall not terminate such coverage until it provides County with proof satisfactory to County that equal or better insurance has been secured and is in place.
 - 3. The inclusion of more than one insured shall not operate to impair the rights of one insured against another insured, and the coverage afforded shall apply as though separate policies had been issued to each insured, but the inclusion of more than one insured shall not operate to increase the limits of the insurer's liability.
 - 4. For claims related to this Project, the Grantee's insurance is primary coverage to the County, and any insurance or self-insurance programs maintained by the County are excess to Grantee's insurance and will not be called upon to contribute with it.
 - 5. Any failure to comply with reporting or other provisions of the Parties, including breach of warranties, shall not affect coverage provided to County, its officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers.
 - 6. Grantee shall furnish County with certificates and original endorsements affecting the required coverage prior to execution of this Agreement by County. The endorsements shall be on forms as approved by the County's Risk Manager or County Counsel. Any deductible or self-insured retention over One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000)

shall be disclosed to and approved by County. If Grantee does not keep all required policies in full force and effect, County may, in addition to other remedies under this Agreement, take out the necessary insurance, and Grantee agrees to pay the cost of said insurance. County is also hereby authorized with the discretion to deduct the cost thereof from the monies owed to Grantee under this Contract.

7. County is to be notified immediately if twenty-five percent (25%) or more of any required insurance aggregate limit is encumbered and Grantee shall be required to purchase additional coverage to meet the aggregate limits set forth above.

VIII. HOLD HARMLESS AND INDEMNIFICATION

- A. Grantee shall hold harmless, defend and indemnify the County and its officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers from and against any and all liability, loss, damage, expense, costs (including without limitation costs and fees of litigation) of every nature arising out of or in connection with Grantee's performance of work hereunder or its failure to comply with any of its obligations contained in the Agreement, except such loss or damage which was caused by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the County.
- B. Acceptance of insurance required by this Agreement does not relieve Grantee from liability under this indemnification clause. This indemnification clause shall apply to all damages or claims for damages suffered by Grantee's operations regardless if any insurance is applicable or not.

IX. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE

A. The County, in its sole discretion, may terminate this Agreement immediately upon notice if, in the opinion of the County, Grantee fails to perform the services required under this Agreement within the time limits specified herein, or otherwise fails to comply with the terms of this Agreement, or violates any ordinance, regulation, or other law which applies to its performance herein. In such event, the County may exercise any of its rights under this Agreement or available to it under the law.

C. Any and all notice(s) required to be given pursuant to the terms of this Agreement shall be in writing and either served personally or sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the respective addresses set forth above. Notice shall be effective upon actual receipt or refusal as shown on the receipt obtained pursuant to the forgoing.

XI. MISCELLANEOUS

- A. <u>Grantee Status</u>: Grantee certifies that it is a non-profit corporation or tax-exempt governmental unit located in Humboldt County, California.
- B. <u>Restrictions, Limitations or Conditions:</u> This Agreement is subject to any additional restrictions, limitations, or conditions enacted by the Federal and/or State Governments that may affect the provision, terms or funding of this Agreement.
- C. Relationship of Parties: Grantee shall perform all work and services as described herein as an independent contractor. No person performing any of the work or services described herein shall be considered an officer, agent, servant or employee of the County nor shall any such person be entitled to any benefits available or granted to employees of the County. Grantee shall be solely responsible for the acts or omissions of its officers, agents, employees, and subcontractors. Nothing herein shall be construed as creating a partnership or joint venture between the County and Grantee.
- D. <u>Assignment</u>: Neither Party shall assign its obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other. Any assignment by Grantee in violation of this provision shall be void, and shall be cause for immediate termination of the Agreement.
- E. <u>Subcontracting</u>: Grantee shall not subcontract any portion of the work required by the Agreement without prior written approval of the County.
- F. <u>Licensing</u>: If Grantee is required to be licensed by the State of California, Grantee shall maintain the appropriate licenses throughout the life of this Agreement.
- G. Nuclear Free Humboldt County Ordinance Compliance: Grantee certifies by its signature below that Grantee is not knowingly or intentionally engaged in the research, development, production, or testing of nuclear warheads, nuclear weapons systems, or nuclear weapons components as defined by the Nuclear Free Humboldt County Ordinance. Grantee agrees to notify County immediately if it becomes a nuclear weapons contractor, as defined above. County may immediately terminate this Agreement if it determines that the forgoing certification is false or if Grantee becomes a nuclear weapons contractor.
- H. <u>Title to Information and Documents</u>: It is understood that any and all documents, information, and reports concerning this Project prepared by and/or submitted by Grantee shall become the property of the County. Grantee may retain copies for its own records. In the event of termination of this Agreement, for any reason whatsoever, Grantee shall promptly turn over all information, writings and documents to the County without exception or reservation.
- I. <u>Nondiscrimination Clause Compliance (Employment And Services)</u>: In connection with the execution of this Agreement, Grantee shall not discriminate in the provision of services or against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religious creed, color,

national origin, ancestry, physical or mental disability (including HIV status and AIDS), medical condition (including cancer and genetic characteristics), marital status, political affiliation, sex (including gender identity and expression, pregnancy, childbirth and related medical conditions), age (over 40 years of age), sexual orientation (including heterosexuality, homosexuality and bisexuality), military service, or any other classifications protected by local, state and federal laws and regulations. Nothing herein shall be construed to require the employment of unqualified persons.

Grantee further assures that it shall abide by the provisions of Title VI and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1974, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, United States Executive Order 11246, as amended by United States Executive Order 11375 and as supplemented in 45 CFR, Part 60, and other applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations to ensure that employment practices and the delivery of services are non-discriminatory. Practices in hiring, compensation, benefits and firing are among the employment practices subject to this requirement.

- J. Entirety of Contract: This Agreement shall constitute the entire Agreement between the parties relating to the subject matter of this Agreement, and shall supersede any previous agreements, promises, representation, understanding and negotiation, whether oral or written, concerning the same subject matter. Any and all acts, which may have already been consummated pursuant to the terms, which are embodied in this Agreement, are hereby ratified.
- K. <u>Amendment</u>: No addition to, or alteration of, the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto.
- L. <u>Compliance with Applicable Laws</u>: Grantee shall comply with any and all applicable federal, state and local laws.
- M. <u>Jurisdiction and Venue</u>: This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Any dispute arising hereunder or relating to this Agreement shall be litigated in the State of California and venue shall lie in the County of Humboldt, unless transferred by court order pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure §§ 394 or 395.
- N. <u>Severability</u>: If any provision of this Agreement, or any portion thereof, is found by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable or invalid for any reason, such provision shall be severable and shall not in any way impair the enforceability of any other provision of this Agreement.
- O. No Waiver: The waiver by either party of any breach or violation of any requirement of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any such breach in the future, or of the breach of any other provision of this Agreement. In no event shall any payment by County constitute a waiver of any breach of this Agreement or any default which may then exist on the part of Grantee. Nor shall such payment impair or prejudice any remedy available to County with respect to any breach of default. County shall have the right to demand repayment of, and Grantee shall promptly refund, any funds disbursed to Grantee, which in the judgment of County were not expended in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- P. Confidential Information: In the performance of this Agreement, Grantee may receive information which is confidential information under state or federal law. Grantee agrees to comply with all laws regarding confidentiality and shall advise and require all subcontractors to comply with the laws of confidentiality.

- Q. <u>Public Works</u>: To the extent the Project, or any part thereof, constitutes a public work under the California Labor Code and/or the Public Contract Code, Grantee will abide by the prevailing wage laws and the contracting requirements of the respective codes. Grantee's indemnification and insurance obligations in favor of County under this Agreement specifically extend to these obligations.
- R. <u>Authority to Execute</u>: Each person executing this Agreement represents and warrants that he or she is duly authorized and has legal authority to execute and deliver this Agreement for or on behalf of the parties to this Agreement. Each party represents and warrants to the other that the execution and delivery of the Agreement and the performance of such party's obligations hereunder have been duly authorized.

1. Project Description

The Sequoia Park Zoo is planning for Phase II of their master plan which includes a Redwood Canopy Walk and Native Predator Zone. The Zoo is developing a fundraising plan and conceptual design for these unique, new features. The design and construction of the Native Predator Zone and Canopy Walk will be a multimillion dollar project, therefore, a solid campaign strategy is essential to see the project to implementation. The Headwaters Fund will contribute \$25,000 to a campaign feasibility study and funding research to determine how the zoo's campaign goals can be best achieved for implementation of the project. The Headwaters Fund will contribute an additional \$5,000 for video production and marketing materials for donors.

2. Objectives

Sequoia Park Zoo is recognized as a valuable community asset and one of the foremost visitor attractions in Humboldt County. The Zoo Foundation (SPZF) has made the commitment to proceed with Phase II of the Master Plan—a Native Predator Zone and Redwood Canopy Walk—the first and only such experience in the country. This expansion builds upon recent successes and is integral to the vision of the Zoo as "The Gateway to the Redwoods" experience. It also strengthens our mission, to inspire conservation of the natural world by instilling wonder, respect and passion for wildlife.

The Zoo Foundation recently established <u>The Ad-Venture Capital Fund</u>, a fundraising initiative to finance the following elements of the Phase II expansion: 1) Native Predator Zone comprehensive exhibit design and all related components; 2) redwood canopy walk design;

- 3) construction, engineering and labor cost estimates; 4) project planning, timelines and oversight;
- 5) preliminary and intermediate marketing and fundraising (campaign) needs.

The planning and design phase for creating a multi-part exhibit and canopy walk is crucial to gaining accurate cost estimates, and achieving the highest in design/construction standards, and all aspects of the physical experiences—especially the interpretation and educational components, and conservation/habitat messaging. This work, including renderings and multi-media representations, are the fundamental building blocks for successful fundraising and marketing campaigns.

The updated Zoo master plan, unanimously adopted by the City Council of Eureka in March 2017, was originally designed in 2006 by Jones & Jones Zoo Architects and revised in 2016 by Studio Hanson | Roberts². The updated plan reflects a decade of species, exhibit and site additions, including the award-winning Watershed Heroes exhibit³ Concurrent to the master plan update, the SPZ Foundation and City of Eureka hired Zoo Advisors⁴ to conduct an in-depth benchmark analysis of the Zoo's financial and business health against other institutions of similar sizes. Based on this research and focusing on the projected financial impact of Phase II, Zoo Advisors created a strategic business plan identifying organizational strengths and challenges, and made recommendations to ensure the future financial sustainability of the Zoo. (Appendix A).

Funding for this initial planning and design step is underway, and currently, \$1.125 M in grants and private donations is being actively pursued.

From Good to Great—Building on Success: Sequoia Park Zoo (the oldest zoo in California, established 1907) is the only zoo in the world situated among old and second growth redwoods, and adjacent to a 70-acre forest of coast redwoods that form a magnificent backdrop. The Zoo is the perfect venue to provide the opportunity for the public to enjoy "up-close and personal' experiences with wildlife and the historic redwood forests unique to this area. Although logged in the early 1900's, several ancient redwood trees still stand and display complex canopy growth and structure. As an integral part of the Zoo experience, the canopy walk will educate and engage tourists and regional residents alike, in an eco-adventure unlike any other. It will be the ultimate, universally-accessible educational expedition high in an urban redwood forest.

World-renowned canopy scientists and ecologists, arborists and canopy adventure experts⁵ visited and assessed the forest potential and agree that the Zoo is the ideal site for a canopy walk given the forest composition, topography, history and location. It will provide the "missing link" experience for visitors to the redwoods. Together, Native Predators and the Canopy Walk will put the Zoo on a transformative path, moving the Zoo from good to great. It has the opportunity to change the trajectory of the Zoo both from an attendance and financial perspective.

The SPZ and Foundation view this expansion as a great potential benefit to the communities in the immediate area (Eureka, Arcata, Ferndale, Fortuna, McKinleyville, et al) and for Humboldt County. In 2016, over 1.4 million tourists visited Northern California, particularly this area, to see the world's tallest trees in the Redwoods National and State Parks⁶. None of these parks, or other roadside attractions, offer the visitor the opportunity to encounter close-up the native species that call this area their home, or to walk through the redwood trees at mid-canopy level and learn about the life cycle and bio-importance of these magnificent and ancient trees.

In their report, Zoo Advisors noted that the Zoo exemplifies intergenerational fun and learning experiences, and the addition of the Native Predators and the integrated canopy walk is a tremendous opportunity for the Zoo to set itself apart as a leader in the regional tourism attractions arena, the Zoo market, and as a conservation leader.

The Native Predator Zone (Appendix B) will feature a black bear habitat with elevated pedestrian walkway, separate mountain lion enclosure, and bobcat, ringtail and fisher areas. The aerial walkway will be a much-needed regional outdoor eco-adventure and education project providing a universally accessible (ADA compliant) experience for people of all ages where they can move—at their own pace—through interactive, multi-media interpretive materials presented on tree platforms and at Tree Top Base Camp. This 'canopy classroom,' will be a one-of-a-kind learning experience for students of all ages (and Eureka & Humboldt County school children, HSU and CR students) to do research and citizen scientific experiments, and to learn about redwood trees and forest ecology from within the mid-canopy level, high off the ground (Appendix C).

The Phase II expansion is poised to deliver an unparalleled transformative and unique experience that will drive attendance growth from across the States and internationally. As the only redwood canopy walk in North America, it will be the ultimate educational and adventure experience high in an urban forest. Built to last generations, its accessibility for all ages and distinctive educational opportunities that tie together nature and wildlife, offer appeal across multiple and diverse audience platforms. For centuries, human curiosity has driven us to explore our universe; yet exploration of forest canopies is a recent phenomenon and one that has, until very recently, been the exclusive territory of scientists and canopy biologists- until now.

If not now ... Research into national Zoo trends show that they are growing in popularity with attendance increasing yearly across all zoo sizes. Investment in new exhibits, experiences and attractions approached \$1 billion over the last five years, and zoos continue to be a leading destination and attraction for their regions, typically ranked in the top 3 destinations in their areas, particularly in smaller communities.

Since the opening of the Watershed Heroes in 2014, Zoo attendance has grown by 28%, and extensive marketing of the Zoo's unique wildlife and nature-based experiences has raised its visibility and awareness throughout Humboldt County and beyond, generating excitement and support for the Zoo and the projects under development. With the expanded geographic reach, membership is growing, and the popular educational and conservation programs and free days provide "universal" zoo access to all community members.

In their strategic business report, Zoo Advisors forecast an increase in Zoo visitors of a minimum 20% in the first year, with the potential of 40% increase. After the opening of the Watershed Heroes exhibit in 2015, attendance soared to over 105,000 visitors, and stay-time

extended 30%—from 1.5 hours to 2.25 hours. The addition of the Native Predator Zone (adding one acre to make a six acre site) and the Redwood Canopy Walk will significantly increase stay-time to 3—4 hours, thus potentially resulting in increased overnight accommodations at local hotels, and use of associated business services. The success of this significant and permanent attraction is dependent upon many factors, a crucial one being long-term, consistent national marketing.

While Phase II will provide local jobs during construction, the foremost positive economic impact will be for local and area hotels, and businesses that provide services and amenities to tourists. With the recent achievement of Old Town Eureka's designation as a State Cultural District, this is the perfect time for business stakeholders, civic leaders and organizations to come together to build Eureka's reputation as a place to visit and stay.

The Zoo will be a major player in this movement with the "Gateway to the Redwoods" experience. Investment in the Ad-Venture Capital Fund will have a lasting, and potentially great economic impact on the immediate community and more broadly, Humboldt County. Successful and sustained benefits are dependent upon close collaborations within the City and the County to market, package, and promote the unique experiences, Eureka attractions (historical, artistic, artisanal), and eco-experiences throughout the county. The ideal outcome will be an increase in economic activity in the City and the County for all attractions, restaurants, galleries, breweries & distilleries, and shops; and will result in longer stay-times (heads in beds).

The Phase II expansion will be reflected in a higher admission price as recommended by Zoo Advisors⁸. The canopy walk, as the unique experience and principal attraction, will support the Zoo's long-term business strategy of becoming financially sustainable, and a major tourist destination.

For the City of Eureka, the increase in admission and new income will cover the cost of additional staff. On the Foundation side, marketing, membership, café and gift shop staff will increase in number to support operational growth. These new positions will be supported by revenue growth in their respective areas. A national marketing budget will be developed to support multi-media messaging. Currently the HCCVB provide much of the marketing, however supplemental campaigns will be created for specific demographics. Future investment in year-round marketing and promotions is estimated to be \$1 to \$1.50 per visitor.

With a goal of raising \$1.125 million, the Ad-Venture Capital Fund will grow over the next two years to ensure that all aspects of the building of Phase II are achievable. The SPZ Foundation







#1 THE REDWOOD FOREST THEN & NOW

The monumental old and second growth redwood trees in the Sequoia Park forest provide a magnificent backdrop for the Zoo, which will be the home of the *only* redwood canopy experience in the northern hemisphere.

The canopy walk will originate at the Bear Vista Lodge overlooking the Native Predator Zone and into the adjacent forest.

The canopy walk will feature a wide, stable ADA-compliant walkway, burma bridge rope walkways spanning ravines and interpretation platforms attached to the trees.

Sequoia Park Forest is the backdrop for the Watershed Heroes exhibit at the Zoo,

2015 - Over a century later, the trees still fascinate and spin their magic.

#2 THE REDWOOD FOREST PROJECT SITE



The forest floor is home to fallen redwood nursery trees and great biodiversity.




The forest is approximately 68 acres of old and second growth redwoods and mixed conifer. The forest areas have fairly steep trails which have become denuded due to heavy public usage.

Of the few dozen old growth redwoods, some are 200'+ tall with trunks eight feet in diameter.

The forest floor is composed of species typically to the redwood blome including firs, ferns, and berries. Underlying the site are the unconsolidated marine sediments of the Franciscan Formation, typically characterized as a layer cake of silt stone, sand stone, and mud stones.

Eureka is a seismically active area and receives an average annual rainfall of approximately 30".

Deep ravines are characteristic of this forest topography. Burma bridges will span the guilles and offer a more adventurous experience.


#3 A BIRDS EYE VIEW - THE EXPERIENCE



The canopy walk will feature wide elevated walkways, tree interpretation platforms for visitors and students to study the canopy and relax in the quiet of the forest.

The walkways will increase in elevation offering multiple forest perspectives and up-close opportunities to study the old and secondary growth redwoods trees.

For the more adventurous, there will be burma rope bridges spanning ravines and cargo rope climbing nets.




