RECOMMENDATION

R3. The Humboldt County Civil Grand Jury recommends a coordinated plan be developed between the Director of Mental Health Services and the Humboldt County Sheriff to facilitate aftercare for inmates with mental health concerns when they are released from the Humboldt County Correctional Facility. This plan should be in place by December 25, 2018.

Response: This recommendation will not be implemented, because similar efforts are already underway.

The California Forensic Medical Group (CFMG) has been asked to submit a proposal to begin providing MH Services at the jail. It should be noted, however, that even if the county contracts with an entity like CFMG it does not guarantee that it could secure staff. Currently there are staff in place who are responsible for discharge planning. Jail MH staff are in the process of shifting to community-based case management to improve engagement/outreach linkage to services and are looking at adding peer coaches to work alongside case managers in the community. New efforts are being made to improve continuity of care for inmates upon release, including partnering with Open Door Community Health Centers. Jail Case Managers can use the Offender Management System (OMS) through Humboldt County Correctional Facility (HCCF) to identify all inmates eligible for release within 30 days and meet with each inmate to help them apply for or re-establish benefits, identify appointment/services needed upon release and help them schedule said appointment. Jail MH policies and procedure are being reviewed and revised to support the above outlined continuity of MH services for inmates upon release from jail.
