Dear Supervisors,

There is no cure for Covid-19. There is no vaccine. The redwood curtain does not exist.

If the County moves to open for business before the rest of the state we will invite the second wave of Covid-19 cases. This is 1 + 1 = 2. If you decide to open the county to tourism you are going to cause an outbreak that our small, fragile health system cannot handle. Without widespread testing and contact tracing you are asking us to play Russian Roulette because some of us will get sick and die, or have non-Covid emergencies and not be able to get medical attention because the hospitals are overflowing with Covid patients.

I was horrified by your recent survey asking the public which businesses should be open first, as if you are going to manage a global health pandemic by public opinion. Perhaps you are simply pandering to the anti-science protesters in front of the courthouse, but it raises the alarm that our leaders are ready to risk the health and safety of our community the same way they are doing it in Georgia and Florida where cases are exploding because of course they are.

Your survey said businesses will be "required" to provide availability of hand-washing for employees and customers. Have you been to old town Eureka? This is not possible for most businesses in the heart of the commercial district and to put that burden on businesses is madness. Your survey said "after reopening the first group of businesses, the county will wait to see if more people get sick." Since you are willing to make guinea pigs of your constituents who absolutely will get sick in this scenario, the county must come up with a solution for widespread handwashing stations.

Retail businesses will also carry the burden of enforcing physical distancing and mask requirements. That might be doable for grocery stores with large staffs but small retail businesses will struggle with this, the consequence of not doing it is serious illness and death. In old town, businesses and the library already have to contend with a large population of homeless and mentally ill. It will require extra staffing in a time when many business will not return to precovid sales numbers for years to come. Does the county have a plan to assist with these issues or are we on our own?

When you prematurely move to reopen the county before widespread testing and contact tracing is in place locally and beyond, you are putting the entire county at risk. People like my husband who has COPD will be at greater risk even if he diligently stays home because once the virus is spreading through the community (which it will) any trip I take to the grocery store increases the odds that the virus will be contracted and brought home.

The United States has seeded a massive outbreak through poor leadership, denial and greed. Humboldt County must be better than this. We have done a great job of flattening the curve with our early actions to shut down non-essential business. We have saved our small and already overburdened medical workers the trauma of an unmanageable onslaught of critically sick patients. But we will undo our success if we start taking our cues from the frauds and con-men in other areas of government (you know who they are).

So I urge you in the strongest possible terms to listen to science and reason, and coordinate with neighboring jurisdictions before flinging the doors open. Many of us are taking a major financial hit but money doesn't matter when you're dead or there aren't enough doctors.

Your legacy as leaders may hinge on this moment alone. Please have the courage to act accordingly.

Subject:

Shelter in Place requirements

As a constituent of Supervisor Wilson, I favor precaution over business promotion in planning Humboldt County's response to the coronavirus pandemic. We need to have at least two weeks of no new cases, widely available testing with fast results and adequate staff for all contact tracing necessary before making changes. We're getting closer to meeting these conditions, so let's be patient a few weeks longer.

The suffering people are experiencing - job loss, mounting debt, hunger - follows choices being made by the administration, the U.S. Senate and the U.S. Judiciary. The federal government has the capacity to cancel debts and create as much money as needed in this crisis. Instead they are choosing to serve wealthy, powerful individuals including themselves. As a resident of this county, we strongly oppose any efforts to undermine the actions and intent of Governor Newsom and State authorities to contain the effects of COVID-19 in Humboldt County.

We cannot afford to pretend that because the Shelter In Place Order is working, it is no longer needed. We still do not have adequate testing capacity for residents with mild cases or who are asymptomatic that would enable us to quarantine only the infected parties. Nor do we have a cure or vaccine for COVID-19. And people who may or may not be infected continue to come and go from Humboldt County.

We are just as vulnerable now as we were when these orders were first put into place. Nothing has changed. At this time, the Shelter In Place Order combined with required masks and social distancing are quite simply the only tools in the toolbox.

Lifting the Shelter In Place Order prematurely risks more harm to our economy as well. Encouraging businesses to open early puts local residents in the difficult position of choosing between protecting their families' health and earning an income. Residents who choose their health over an unsafe job offer will lose badly needed employment benefits that were intended to support families and our economy in this difficult time. The lives and health of employees must supersede short term gain.

We know a second wave of infections will be triggered when restrictions are eased — there is literally nothing to prevent that inevitability. 
The lessons learned in January, February and early March should not be forgotten. We knew covid-19 was coming yet we did not prepare with stay in place or by acquiring materials or backing up our hospitals. The New York Times published a report showing that with the opening of the economy, we will be looking at 100,000 deaths by June. Our county should learn by the near past that we need to keep the things that have kept the epidemic off of our door step. But the people are getting restive. tRump continues saying that we've beaten the virus once and will do it again. But here's the rub. We have only one therapeutic drug, remdesivir, that thus far only shortens the length of the illness in very sick people but doesn't change the morbidity rate. A vaccine is more than just a couple months away. The only thing we have only mitigates the influx of people to our hospitals... nothing else. And if the cancellation of SIP happens, it will be as hard as the proverbial "getting the genie back into the bottle" when trying to SIP again.

The other side is that simply cancelling the SIP and opening businesses doesn't promise either full employment nor consumer confidence. A restaurant with social distancing may only have 25% of the previous seating which means less employees. And I, for one, will be cautious before going into a hair salon (no matter how much I need it) meaning that the 25% is even less. Who knows? And while salons and restaurants may be a problem, the bars won't be. A little liquid courage and we will be standing shoulder to shoulder singing silly songs or watching and shouting at sporting matches while standing on our masks.

I really understand that my life is relatively simple right now. But I live with a target on my back from this virus. Others are suffering horrible financial deprivation. I don't pretend to have an answer. But we need to think clearly about what we do. It's not just surfers complaining about civil rights and being able to surf. I wish it were that easy. But it is young families out of work and they are doing a good job being relatively patient. It is the elderly like me trying to survive without taking unfair advantage. But it is also those working mothers and fathers who can't afford to be sick because the illness affects both the health of their families and also their livelihoods.

The one thing I do know is that to open everything places those families sacrifice in jeopardy. Please, proceed with caution. Bohn wants to throw it all out. What do the scientists say? Is there any way to accommodate them all in some way?

I was informed that the Supervisors may be considering reopening the County soon and will also be considering asking Governor Newsom to rescind the SIP order.

My current occupation is advising small businesses on issues of finance and operations. They are, to a person, worried about the economic impact on their businesses. They also have heard, and feel, the frustrations of a very vocal minority of people in the County.

However, they are more concerned about the safety of their staff, their customers, their families, and themselves. As am I.

Although Humboldt County may appear to have missed devastating effects of COVID-19 so far, I believe it is mostly because of the SIP and community acceptance of shared sacrifice. To remove the SIP before scientific evidence indicates that the risk of a surge is very low would be, I believe, very foolish and dangerous. Our healthcare system is not very robust.

My business colleagues and I believe that the overwhelming majority of the public would be reluctant to engage in the same economic activities as before the coronavirus. Most retailers I have talked to are very reticent to reopen because: 1) They do not believe very many customers will venture out to shop, and 2) they are quite concerned about how to protect their staff and themselves.

Some have expressed concern about possible lawsuits if a customer were to blame them for poor protection in their establishments. Absent firm guidance from a science-based, trusted organization about protection, most businesses would not be eager to simply reopen, and many people would be reluctant to risk their health.

I would ask the Board to place first priority on the health and safety of our citizens, even though it may cause more economic pain. People will survive an economic crisis; they may not survive a COVID infection.

The NYTimes reports today that behind the scenes, Trump's own Administration is predicting that the coronavirus will take a disastrous turn for the worse. Based on government modeling from FEMA, we'll have about 200,000 new cases each day by the end of this month, up from 25,000 cases now. In the past 7 weeks, while we've been sheltering in place, not much has changed. The U.S. is stuck at the top of our peak and things are about to get much worse according to projections. An opening of the economy at this time is predicted to put us back where we were in mid-March.

To date, we still don't have the testing, contact tracing, PPE, etc. that we need. The only aides we have to protect ourselves and our communities are to continue to shelter-in-place, wash hands, wear masks and practice social distancing.

I am a firm believer in science, which teaches us to make cautious observations, to test our hypotheses and to move forward only with cautious deliberation. Hasty decisions are rarely good decisions. The rush to "get back to normal" will only make things worse for everyone, including those of us doing our best to follow guidelines provided by health experts and scientists. Moreover, it will only prolong the nightmare that challenges us. We could all benefit from more adult restraint and less tantrum-throwing.

My husband and I are in the high age, vulnerable group that really needs to stay at home, I worry that opening too soon will create more danger for my children, instacart workers and others we rely on to bring us supplies. Their endangerment will further

endanger their families and the community at large.. As much as I understand the realistic money concerns, impatience puts us all at greater risk. That we have kept our local cases to 53 is a function of the fact that a large number of us are doing our best to shelter in place. We all realize the cost economically, but health concerns must come first. Better to be safe than sorry! We must remain vigilant until it is proven safe to move forward.

I trust medical experts more than the Trump Administration and a President who is actively encouraging people to protest the safety guidelines for his personal political aims.

Dear Supervisor Madrone,

My name is Alexis Brown, a Humboldt County resident. I am writing in support of the replacement of Ordinance 2641 regarding COVID-19 and evictions. The new changes take steps to address the severity of the economic impacts that working families in Humboldt County face from the pandemic. As a tenant, I'm worried about the impacts of this crisis on our small community, residents in neighboring Eureka have been granted tenant protections from their city council, I hope our Board of Supervisors will step up and give all of Humboldt County's tenants the protections they need during this crisis.

Data from the HUD American Community Survey shows that in 2016, 30% of Humboldt renter households (7,190 households) paid more than 50% of their income on housing. It is unrealistic to think that families that spend more than half their income on housing can repay back rent in a space of 90 days. In all probability at least 7,190 households (not individuals, households) will face eviction and probably homelessness at the end of that period. An extension to 180 days, as well as the other measures, provide a more realistic option to allow families to save the resources to pay off their landlords.

The County itself will also face a grave impact from a wave of evictions and should do everything it can to lessen, if not halt, that wave. The homeless situation here has been a crisis for a long time. As of 2019, Humboldt had an estimated homeless population of 1702, of which 1402 were unsheltered. The County lacks the ability to deal adequately with a homeless population of only 1700 individuals. With at least 7,190 households looking at eviction and homelessness, now is the time to ask how many more homeless can the County afford, and to take the measures to lessen that impact.

For these reasons, I urge you to support the revised ordinance.

I DISAGREE with the suggestion to send a letter to Governor Newsom to remove the statewide SIP. The emphasis of File #: 20-545 is misplaced in its focus on pushing toward a more chaotic County-led pandemic response rather than working within a system of a State plan.

State planning and guidance are essential in managing the public health and economic components of the COVID-19 pandemic. This can be done in partnership and while advocating for Humboldt County.
